## Sawchuk Will Reconsider Decision To Quit In Month

DETROIT (AP)—Fidgety Terry Sawchuk told the hockey world Monday he's through—at least for a month.

Blaming nervousness for his decision to quit Boston Bruins after 6½ brilliant seasons of goaltending, the brush-cut goalie said he would confer with the club in a month to reconsider his decision.

Announcing to a crowded press conference what he called "the toughest decision of my life," the 27-year-old Sawchuk said he could no longer take the goalkeeper grind.

Although he was in apparent good spirits, Sawchuk was obviously tense as he read a two-page statement which said in part: "Since my illness in December, when I spent 12 days in Carney Hospital in Boston for mononucleosis, I certainly have not felt in the right frame of mind though I have tried to adjust myself to continue playing for the Bruins."

"I haven't been getting the proper sleep... I've lost my appetite... my nerves are shot... and I'm just edgy and nervous all the time."

Although Sawchuk's retirement last Tuesday came as a surprise, he insisted "it was not an overnight thought."

He had eluded Boston reporters for two days, finally returned to his Detroit home Friday and still refused to say why he decided to call it quits. At that time—after an unsuccessful attempt to get away from Detroit writers—the three-time Vezina Trophy winner as the National Hockey League's best goalie insisted his recent illness had nothing to do with his retirement.

But general manager Lynn Patrick said that if Sawchuk were really ill, he would be "welcome back with open arms."

In Toronto Saturday night, Patrick had predicted Sawchuk would be back with the Bruins "within a month." And he predicted Boston would win the Stanley Cup "with Terry Sawchuk in the nets."

Sawchuk himself said in his statement today: "I'm still under contract to the Boston hockey club, who have always treated me very well," he said. "But my health, for my family's sake is certainly more important than any monetary consideration."

## Flying Curlers Finding Scottish Curling Tough

EDINBURGH (CP) — Canada's flying curlers are finding the competition rough in Scotland, home of the winter game.

The party of 64 curlers from Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick lost two exhibition series at the Edinburgh Curling Club Monday — the first by an aggregate of 75 points to 25 and the second by 102 to 65.

The only Canadian rinks to win individual games were skipped by W. E. Donovan of Halifax and Paul Harrigan of Saint John. Donovan took a close 12-11 decision.

The party, led by J. E. MacLeod of Charlottetown, P.E.I., is playing a series of exhibition games in Scotland, London and Switzerland. They arrived in Scotland by air Friday and are scheduled to return to Canada Feb. 8.

The others: Prince Edward Island vs Manitoba; Royal Caledonia Curling Club of Scotland vs Alberta; Midwest Curling Association (U.S.) vs Royal Montreal and No. 1; Quebec vs Nova Scotia; New Brunswick vs Newfoundland; Saskatchewan vs Grand National Curling Club of America; Royal Montreal No. 2 vs British Columbia.

Leo Johnson of Winnipeg, Canadian champion in 1934, and Garnet Campbell of Avonlea, Sask., 1955 winner, are the two former Canadian champions in the bouspiel. The finals will be played Friday at the Forum.

A host of friendly matches are being played as well to mark Royal Montreal's birthday as the oldest curling club in North America.

## Pancho Gonzales Takes 4-1 Spread

BRISBANE, Australia (AP) — Pancho Gonzales took a 4-1 lead over Ken Rosewall in their professional tennis series Monday by outlasting the little Australian in a rugged match which lasted 3½ hours.

The pro champion from Los Angeles finally prevailed 3-6, 6-3, 11-9, 1-6, 15-13.

Both men were near complete exhaustion at the finish. Gonzales commented wearily, "that was one of the toughest I've ever played."

## Harvey, Beliveau, Chadwick And Reibel Trophy Winners

MONTREAL (CP)—Two members of Montreal Canadiens and one each from Detroit Red Wings and Toronto Maple Leafs led in the mid-season voting for individual trophies, the National Hockey League announced Monday.

The leaders at the half-way mark of the season are: James Norris Memorial Trophy for the best all-round defenseman: Doug Harvey, Montreal.

Hart Trophy, for the most valuable player to his team: Jean Beliveau, Montreal.

Lady Byng Memorial Trophy, for the player showing the best type of sportsmanship and gentlemanly conduct combined with a high standard of playing ability: Earl (Dutch) Reibel, Detroit.

Calder Memorial Trophy, for the most promising rookie: Ed Chadwick, Toronto.

Harvey, Beliveau and Reibel were the respective winners of the same trophies last season.

The voting is done by sports writers, broadcasters and telecasters in the six NHL cities. Each city has equal voting strength. Five points are allotted for a first-place choice, three for second and one for third. A second ballot will be taken at the end of the season. Combined totals for each half-season will determine the winners.

Harvey made it a runaway for the Norris award but the vote for the other three awards was comparatively close. Harvey had 83 of a possible 90 points.

Beliveau, Montreal centre, had 51 points as top candidate for the Hart trophy.

Reibel topped voting for the Byng award with 24 points. Goalie Ed Chadwick of Toronto topped the rookies with 48 points.

## N. H. L. Scoring Derby No Longer Walkaway For Jean

Gorie Howe and Terrible Ted Lindsay may make things interesting for Jean Beliveau in the National Hockey League scoring race before the season is over. Latest scoring figures show Beliveau at the top of the league with 58 points on 24 goals and 34 assists but in recent games Howe and Lindsay have been coming fast while Beliveau has been that is a standstill for Beliveau. Howe and Lindsay are tied in the second slot with 54 points. Howe has 27 goals — best in the league — and 27 assists while Lindsay has 24 and 30.

However, as far as the rest of the league is concerned there doesn't seem to be any other entries in the scoring race other than these three. Old Rocket Richard in the top place scored tied with Bert Olmstead and Norm Ullman, and each of these have only 39 points — 19 behind the lead of Beliveau. Dickie Moore of Montreal is enjoying his greatest season with 22 goals and 15 assists for 37 points.

Lindsay, you may recall, was in the receiving end of a blast from Jack Adams only a few weeks ago for his lack of fire. In Adams opinion Lindsay wasn't playing up to his capabilities and the reasons given were his outside interests in the business world. The last laugh will apparently be Lindsay's or possibly Jack's for being a canny old gent, Adams may well have had Lindsay's character in mind when issuing the barbs. Nothing like a few sharp remarks to put spark into an old warhorse like Ted.

Rocket Richard is a sure bet to break to 20-goal mark for another season of his long 14 year career. He has 19 now and is also approaching the 500 mark in his career and should pass it with some to spare next season, and the Rocket will certainly be a found next season harring injuries.

Montreal Canadiens seem to be heading for their second consecutive league title although their winning streak came to a halt in Chicago Sunday. The Canadiens only have a 2-point lead on second place Detroit Wings and the Wings have two games in hand but we wouldn't bet a lead nickel against the chances of the Montrealers. Boston Bruins are still holding town third place an even 10 points up on Toronto and 6 behind Wings. Over the weekend indications were that the Bruins will miss Sawchuk more than was at first feared when the Leafs dropped them twice even though according to reports Howe Stecker's crew-cuts were outplayed in both games.

Yesterday Sawchuk announced that he quit the Bruins because his nerves were "shot." Just why he didn't say so earlier when every one connected with hockey was

asking him is still a mystery and it will likely go unanswered. It would have been such easier on everyone concerned — especially Sawchuk — if he had gone to Lunn Patrick told him his nerves "were shot" and asked to be relieved of duties for a month or so. Patrick would have undoubtedly granted the request — not wanting to antagonize probably the best and most temperamental goaltender in hockey.

If Sawchuk had gone to Patrick earlier then the whole thing could have been done quietly with a minimum of fanfare. Sawchuk's name would have been only one on a long list of other goaltenders who had the same trouble including Gerry MacNeill, Bill Durnan, Al Rollins, Harry Lumley, and fans and sports writers everywhere would have been sorry and sympathetic and when he returned to action he would have been welcomed back.

His explanation coming this late in the game won't erase the incidents of the past week completely from the minds of his Boston hockey following and when and if he does return he will be in for a rough time.

We would still like to know why he didn't open up earlier and tell everyone what was bothering him. Maybe he likes publicity — favorable or unfavorable.

## Football Ass'n Watching For Soccer Crisis

LONDON (AP) — The International Federation of Football Associations (FIFA) watched and waited Monday in the explosive soccer crisis sparked by the South American tour of the outlawed Hungarian Honved team.

Honved and Flamengo of Rio De Janeiro played a match last Saturday despite a ban by FIFA and the Brazilian Sports Federation, CBD. FIFA and CBD supported the Hungarian football association's demand that Honved not play any overseas matches.

Arthur Drewey, president of FIFA, said Monday: "Honved's match was played against a club under the jurisdiction of another national football association. The match was at club level, and each of the respective associations has regulations which enable them to deal with any breach of their decisions."

Drewey added: "Unless a situation arises in which the associations concerned cannot deal with it and reports the matter to FIFA, we are unlikely to interfere. It will be necessary for a complaint to be laid with FIFA for us to act. So far we have not received one."

## Robin Roberts Takes Pay Cut In Signing For Tenth Season

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Robin Roberts, the righthander who has won more baseball games than any other Philadelphia Philly hurler but Grover Cleveland Alexander, Monday signed for his 10th season with the National League Club—for less money.

Roberts said he had taken a slight cut over the \$50,000 he reportedly got last year.

Roberts, the mainstay of the Phillies' pitching staff, had a "bad year" in 1956, winning 19 ball games while losing 18. He had topped the 20-victory mark for six straight years before that.

Roberts' signing came amid reports that a big player trade was in the wind involving the Chicago Cubs, the Phils and St. Louis Cardinals. Figuring in the rumors were two Phils' players, outfielder Richie Ashburn and pitcher Harvey Haddix. General manager Roy Hamey denied there was anything definite in the wind now.

Roberts, who has won a total of 179 major league games, all in a Philadelphia uniform, has an excellent chance to top Alexander's 190-victory mark in the coming season.
