## Itinerants From Far Away Places Brought Wonderment

Out of our childhood too in a fascinating sight our children have been denied were the canvas-covered gypsy vans of old with their swarthy men in attendance, the dark-skinned dark-eyed women, the strange children and adorable babes.

Those vans were drawn too by thin plodding horses and always they had their following of mongrels to keep children at a distance. It seemed, though we were so much entranced at a glimpse of the strange people and the wandering life they enjoyed.

"I had company today" we recall mother-to-us comment one school day, when we children came to dinner. "Yes, a couple of gypsies-women. They were selling lace. They must be camped not too far away."

"And" we questioned eagerly "did they tell your fortune?" "Tell my fortune, child! Don't be silly! What nonsense—who can read the future! Doesn't your own common sense tell you that? Gypsies—they're a thievish lot, folks say. It's as well to be civil to them but leave them to themselves."

"But they might..." "Might indeed!" We wonder if a dark eyed, bright kerchieved woman scanning the lines on our childish palm then could have, perhaps caught sight of this farmwife, limbing to the low roof of the teller-run today after Alex, so that from this vantage point we might look out over the hazy Autumn distance to note the progress of the field-work there?

So the old times we would bring back for a day—for longer, for the children who these days enjoy so many material comforts, and entertainments, yet withal are denied many a thrill and loveliness of the long ago years.

Peddlars' visits we had then—men from far away Biblical places and scenes; men too from sunny Italy and the dark-bearded, grim-faced Russians were also among vendors who came to farm-doors.

Indians came too on occasion, the gentle Micmacs peddling their baskets about. How ingenious and pretty and sturdy their handicraft was. We doubt if any small daughter of a household did not count among her treasures a basket of them. Nor were we afraid of the Indians.

The Italian, or bearded Russian, or the gypsies, like the feared "Black Douglas" of his

story might "get" the naughty child, but never the Indians who were more or less "all God's children" themselves, and whose Summer visits brought glimpses of other peoples, other ways of life, to add interest to the lives of youngsters of Island-farms of that now long ago we have lost.

## True "Cobbler" Has Two Different Parts

"Several of our readers, Madame, have asked for a definition of the dessert called 'cobbler,'" remarked the Chef.

"True cobblers consist of two parts," I replied.

"One, sweetened fresh berries or sliced fresh fruit, combined with light corn syrup, or sugar and a little water, layered in a baking dish; and two, covered with a layer of not-very-sweet cake batter, spread so the fruit peeks through when it is baked."

"Is baking powder biscuit topping ever used Madame?"

"Sometimes, Chef. But in that case, the dessert is not a real cobbler."

"I prefer it served warm, rich and juicy 'as is,' or with plain or whipped cream. Warm, just-baked cobblers give dramatic temperature contrast to cold-plate dinners."

"Use any reasonable fresh fruit—berries, pitted cherries, sliced fresh apricots or peaches or apples, or a combination; or try halved, pitted red or purple plums."

Measurements are level; recipes for 6.

**Plum Cobbler:** Into buttered 7" by 11" baking dish, spoon layer of 2 1/2 c. quartered pitted plums; stir in 1 c. light corn syrup. Top with plain cake batter. (A cake mix makes topping too sweet and over-rich.)

Bake 35 min. in mod oven, 375 degrees F.

**Batter topping:** Blend until fluffy 4 tsp. room-soft butter or margarine (or 1/2 stick), 6 tsp. sugar, 1 egg and 1/2 tsp. lemon extract.

Sift together 1 1/2 c. presifted enriched flour, 2 1/2 tsp. baking powder, 1/2 tsp. vanilla or lemon extract and 1-3 tsp. salt. Add alternately with 1/2 c. milk to first mixture. Spoon over plums; finish as directed.

**TOMORROW'S DINNER**  
Hot or Jellied Consomme  
Beef-Sausage-Olive Loaf  
Tomato Rice  
Green Peas  
Lettuce Wedges  
Russian Dressing  
Plum Cobbler  
Hot or Iced Coffee  
Tea Milk  
Beef-Sausage-Olive Loaf: Put 1 lb. beef-chuck, ground twice, in 2 qt. mixing bowl.  
Add 1/4 lb. sausage meat, 1 egg, 1/4 c. milk or beef broth, 1/4 c. wheat germ, 1 tsp. salt, 6 drops Tabasco, 1/4 tsp. liquid onion juice and 1-3 c. sliced pimiento olives (optional). Mix thoroughly.  
Let stand 10 min.  
Form into loaf about 10" long. Place in lightly-oiled shallow pan.  
Bake 45 min. in mod oven, 350 degrees F.  
Baste once with 1 tsp. vegetable oil mixed with 1/4 c. warm water.  
Tomato Rice: Into 2 qt. saucepan measure 1 1/2 c. not-washed converted or long grain rice, 1 tsp. salt, 1 c. cold water, 1 tsp. fresh lemon juice and 2 c. cold tomato juice.  
Cover.  
Place over high heat until boiling. Then simmer-cook 14 min. Uncover; steam-dry 5 min. Season tomato rice, while cook-
