**Vast Change In World's Oil Situation**

The world oil situation has so changed in the last year that the question of Iranian production has passed almost entirely from the economic into the political field.

When Iran nationalized her British-operated fields last May there were fears of a world shortage. The industry adopted emergency measures for distribution. Now new production elsewhere has taken up the slack, although increases in demand are not fully met.

Thus, as he once again breaks off negotiations with Western interests seeking a solution to Iran's quarrel with Britain, Premier Mossadegh faces a changed situation. The west is demonstrating that it can do without Iran better than Iran can do without its markets.

In this latest development, representatives of the World Bank sought to establish interim operation of the wells pending some later agreement between Britain and Iran. It wanted to use the British technicians who know the operation. Mossadegh said he'd have no return to Britons.

The bank was willing to let Iran have part of the oil for resale at pegged prices. Mossadegh apparently wanted the right to cut prices, thereby helping Iran establish her own markets as a weapon in future negotiations. The bank said no.

So the negotiations collapsed.

Now the big questions are how long Mossadegh will last as premier with revenue from the fields indefinitely postponed, and whether Iran is headed for political chaos and a possible Communist coup.

Britain has believed all the time that when the pinch became great enough, Mossadegh would be ousted and Iran would bargain. The United States has hoped that an agreement could be reached on a better basis.

The failure of the World Bank negotiations will hardly mean that the U. S. effort will drop. Some new proposal will probably follow return of the bank's representatives to Washington. If so, it must come quickly, for all the political and economic signs point to an early crisis in Iran.
