These Christmas Stars are such publishers that it is very generally hoped the publishers will see their way clear to continue their publication. BOSTON PRICES.—An official circular of the 18th says: The egg market has been rather quiet the past week, and there is little change in prices. Easterns have to be strictly fresh laid to reach 30c., and western fresh gathered are bringing from 25 to 27c. Early packed ice-house lots sell slowly at 22c., and fall-packed are quiet at 23c. The supply of potatoes is fully equal to the demand. Island Canned goods bring from 75 to 90c., according to quality.

SCOTT ACT IN KING'S COUNTY.—During the progress of a drunken row near Cardigan Bridge on Monday night last, a man named Roderick Macdonald, belonging to St. Peter's Road, 1st of 53, was badly beaten and cut about the head. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. Ottawa Notes. OTTAWA, Dec. 22. P. Purcell, M. P., who has just returned from Digby, states that the "missing link" will be tracked by January 10th and opened January 22nd. The Department of Agriculture has information that 150 settlers from one settlement in Dakota have arranged to move to Manitoba in March. The Minister of Marine has invited Mr. Pimmsoll, who is now in New York, to attend a conference with cattle shippers at Montreal on Friday next. Leave was granted to-day to the American schooner Golden Hind to sell her cargo of fresh fish at Halifax, where she is in for repairs. Telegrams from the police authorities at Regina utterly refute all sensational rumors of trouble caused by American Indians crossing the Canadian frontier.

Sad Fatalities. FREDERICTON, Dec. 22. Jeremiah Burt, of Keswick, York Co., was killed last evening at his home by a kick from a horse. He went out to help his son to unhitch a team, when one of the horses kicked him with both hind feet in the breast and head. He only lived a few minutes after the accident. He was about 70 years old, and was a brother of Benj. P. Burt of this city. Wm. Smith, a young man of St. Mary's, died suddenly last night of blood poisoning. About ten days ago, while paring apples the knife slipped, slitting his thumb about an inch. Swelling at once set in and baffled the skill of the physicians, resulting in his death.

Halifax News. HALIFAX, Dec. 22. There is war in the Halifax fire department. The members of two of the divisions have publicly notified the Board of Fire Commissioners and the City Council that they will not serve under Captain Condon, but will only act under the direct command of the Board of Fire Commissioners. No more bodies of the victims of the wharf disaster have been recovered. One thousand dollars have been subscribed in aid of the families of the drowned men. A Defaulter Leaves. MERIDEN, Conn., Dec. 22. John Watson, head book-keeper and confidential man of the Meriden Silver Plate Company, who was short in his accounts, has left the city for parts unknown. He confessed his guilt on Friday. He leaves a wife and two children.
