LONDON, Nov. 27.—It is reported that Chang Kwayan, the Chinese general who surrendered to the Germans, at Kiauchau Bay, has been condemned to death by a Chinese War Council.

Goes to Inspect Steam Whalers For The Next Arctic Expedition.

NEW YORK, Nov. 27.—Lieutenant Peary sailed today for London. During his absence he will examine the Scottish and Norwegian steam whalers ordered for his Arctic expedition next year.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL

BRASS, Guinea Coast, Nov. 24.—The column of troops commanded by Major Arnold, consisting of a hundred and eighty men belonging to the Niger Constabulary, field guns and Maxim guns, which was sent to subdue the slave-raiding Prince of Idua who was entrenched in a place four days' march from the river, and who for a month previous to the departure of the troops had been raiding the Akpoto tribes for sixty miles around his headquarters, landed at Elobe on Nov. 14th, and marched direct to the prince's stronghold. The latter was defended by four hundred guns and a hundred rifles. There was a hot engagement in front of the town. The Honussas of the British force charged up the right foot wall surrounding the place and completely routed the defenders. The Prince fled to the bush and the town was burned and evacuated on Nov. 18th. The enemy lost heavily. The British force had two men killed and twelve wounded.

LONDON, November 25.—The Berlin correspondent of the Daily News alleges that a pamphlet just issued by Prof. Schaefer, of Heidelberg university, on the needs of the German navy, reflects the views held in the "very highest quarters." The pamphlet contains that the "increase of the German navy has the simple object of enabling Germany to sustain a defensive war against England by preventing a blockade of the German coast." It also hints at the eventualities of an Anglo-Russian war, which "Germany would require a strong navy in order to preserve her neutrality and to reap the advantage of an extended commerce."

LONDON, Nov. 24.—The Rome correspondent of the Daily Chronicle says: "The report is confirmed that the powers have decided to blockade Constantinople in case Turkey refuses to withdraw her troops from Crete, and to accept an European governor of the island."

LOUISVILLE, Ky., November 25.—J. W. Wilson, general manager of the Alaska Commercial Company, of San Francisco, has just returned from Alaska. He has made many trips to that country in the past several years. Mr. Wilson says that the people in the east and middle west have a real but a faint conception of the great number of persons who will join the rush to the Klondike next spring. He says the rush to the gold fields of California was nothing to what the wild stampede to the Klondike will be the coming spring. Already thousands of people in every state are getting ready for the trip.

MONTREAL, Nov. 24.—John A. Diome, Methodist minister at Caughnawaga, was struck this morning by the Halifax C. P. R. train as he was walking on the track near Highlands. Mr. Diome was deaf and it is thought that this was the cause of the accident. The crown of his head was crushed in and he received several other injuries. He seems to have been walking at the side of the track when struck.

ST. JOHN, Nov. 24.—The local council of women to day, by a majority vote, asked the legislature for a curfew law for the city of St. John and other New Brunswick towns.
