

# Baltimore Edges Senators In Opening Day's Game

## Gus Triandos Hits Homer; Rookie Drives In Winner

WASHINGTON (AP) — Baltimore Orioles kept hammering away at Washington pitchers Monday and finally after 11 innings won a 7-6 opening day victory over the Senators. President Eisenhower headed a distinguished crowd in sun-splashed Griffith Stadium.

Eisenhower sat through all three hours and 37 minutes of the game. He cheered the Senators in vain after getting the contest started by throwing out the traditional first ball.

At the finish it was a 39-year-old Baltimore rookie, Carl Powis, who knocked in the winning run with a sacrifice fly to centre field.

Dick Williams, who had opened the 11th with a double, scored and sent the crowd of 23,872 home.

In the fourth the Senators eluded Baltimore starter Hal (Skinny) Brown and reliever Mike Formicola for five runs.

**FIRST TRIUMPH**  
The Orioles, edging toward their first opening-day triumph since they entered the American League in 1954, tallied twice in the fifth and shot ahead in the seventh on Gus Triandos' booming two-run homer into the left-centre bleachers.

Clint Courtney doubled in the Washington run in the eighth, making it six-all and sending the

game into overtime. Triandos also drove in the Orioles' two fifth-inning runs with a single and added a two-bagger after Powis had ushered Williams home in the 11th.

Baltimore, known for its lack of plate power, found no difficulty with Rob Chakales and Camillo Pascual, who pounded out 15 hits. Pascual, who relieved starter Chakales in the eighth, gave up only one run but that was the big one. He was charged with the loss.

**ALLOWED THREE HITS**  
Billy Loes, a veteran at 27, pitched the last two innings, allowed three hits but no runs and gained the decision. He succeeded Brown, Formicola and Billy O'Dell on the mound.

Chakales, roughed up for six runs and 10 hits, accounted for two of Washington's runs with a three-bagger in the fifth inning splurge that gave the Senators a 5-2 lead. Chakales, a bull pen operator until manager Charley Dressen awarded him the coveted opening-day assignment, lived up to proceedings at the start with a pair of wild pitches that assisted Baltimore to a 1-0 margin in the first.

# Blake Admits Canadiens Need More Drive Tonight

MONTREAL (CP) — Coach Toe Blake brought his disappointed Montreal Canadiens back home Monday convinced that the team's famed power play needs a reviving shot if the resurgent Boston Bruins are to be stopped.

After dropping three games in a row to the Montrealers, the Bruins came back fighting in Boston Garden Sunday and grabbed a 2-0 decision.

"Our power play was lousy," said Blake. "There was no drive to it. We still have the advantage, of course, leading 3-1 in games, but we've just got to go out there tomorrow night and put more drive in our play if we are going to win that necessary fourth game."

"We're disappointed naturally in not winning last night. At the same time we got an even break in the two games in Boston and on that basis we are not dissatisfied, but the team has got to come up for the Tuesday game and regain its drive."

**CRITICAL OF REFEREES**  
Blake wasn't too happy about the refereeing Sunday night of Red Storey. "But what's the use of kicking — it won't get us anywhere."

"How can a guy get run into the boards like Henri Richard was slammed by Leo Bolvin and no penalty was given? Yet cheaper penalties were called."

"Dollard St. Laurent got a cheap penalty — it was called high-sticking — that put us two men short, with Boston one man down, in the

first period. That's when the Bruins got their big first goal. "But Jack Bionda of Boston high-sticked five times and was penalized only once. Oh, well, I guess that was a good average of what was called. Maybe it figures out that both teams got away with stuff. Anyway, there's no use squawking about the refereeing."

**POWER PLAY WEAK**  
Blake felt that not only was the Montreal power play weak but "three of our big scorers couldn't even get a decent shot on goal."

"At the same time let's give the Bruins credit. They played a good game. Now it's up to us to play a better one and beat them."

Henri Richard appeared to have suffered no further damage to his left knee, injured in the Thursday game in Boston, and didn't seem to have any bad effects from the racking up Bolvin gave him. But the little rocket was slightly on the limp from a sore ankle as he left the train Monday. A shot by teammate Dickie Moore caught Henri squarely on the ankle but he is expected to be ready for Tuesday's game.

Canadiens and many of their supporters left Boston by train immediately after the game. The Bruins stayed at home overnight and were due in Montreal late Monday by plane.

The Bruins came out of Sunday night's game in good spirits and except for a few minor bruises and cuts, are in good shape physically.

Fleming Mackell, an all-star forward in the 1952-53 season but

on the auction block a year ago, has been the big man for the Bruins against the Canadiens in the final. He has scored all but one of the Boston goals in the four games so far, including the two they got Sunday night.

"I just hope we can keep going tomorrow night," he said in Boston before the Bruins left for Montreal. "We've got to keep driving against these guys. I know we're tired, but don't think they aren't pretty tired, too."

Coach Milt Schmidt says pride is the driving force behind the Bruins.

"We've got to play a helluva game tomorrow night in Montreal," he said. "These fellows have a lot of pride. They didn't want to be beaten in four games. Now that they've beaten Montreal once they're convinced they can do it again. We've got to win 'em all. I think we can do it."

## Beliveau's Baby Is Too Small He Says

MONTREAL (CP) — Jean Beliveau, Montreal Canadiens centre star, saw his 7½-pound daughter for the first time Monday and shied off from holding her.

"Later, it's too small," said Jean, gazing at the blanket-clad bundle, his first child. The baby will be named Helene.

The baby was born Friday night while Beliveau was in Boston for the Stanley Cup playoffs. He returned with his teammates Monday.

## Sugar Ray Is Hungrier For Title Than Any Other Time

GREENWOOD LAKE, N.Y. (AP) — He's held the welterweight crown once and the middleweight championship three times but Monday Sugar Ray Robinson is "hungrier" for a title than any other time in his long and fabulous career.

"I'm not the champion anymore," said the 36-year-old Harlem dandy at his training camp. "I sure want to be again."

Robinson said he's fighting more for the title now than for the money although he's never been one to overlook another fat payday. Since making his comeback, he's had three rich purses for his two winning title fights with Bobo Olson and his loss of the crown to Gene Fullmer, Jan. 2.

"I'm in good shape financially," said Ray. "I've straightened out with the income tax man, my business are in good shape, and I could quit now and live a normal life."

How much longer would he

fight? "Long enough to get that belt back from Fullmer and take on Carmen Basilio (welterweight champion) in a big outdoor fight in New York in the summer. That should do it."

Robinson's price has been atung by the loss to Fullmer whom he characterizes as "a strong, awkward boy."

Ray is determined to regain the title and prestige. He's going through the most gruelling workouts of a pro career dating back to 1940.

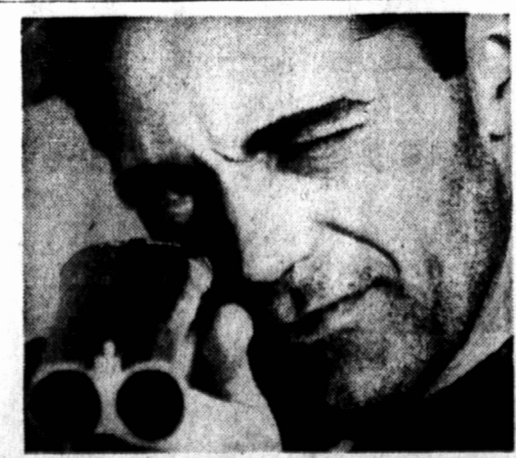
