CONTRACT BRIDGE

Many books on play show the best way to deal with certain combinations of cards when you run into them, but since no book can be expected to list all possible combinations, it is wise to be familiar with the methods used to solve percentage problems.

now decide whether to play the Jack or the King. In this deal the decision is crucial.

It is easy enough, looking at all four hands, to see that the king is the winning play. But in a different hand the king might be the losing play-for example, if East held Q-7.

In attempting to solve such problems, the easiest approach is to eliminate from consideration the adverse holdings over which there is no control. Thus if West has both the A-Q, or East has A-Q-8-7 or A-Q-7, declarer cannot make a winning play. He is down and nothing can be done about it.

Declarer can next consider a 2-2 division in hearts. But since East will hold A-7, as often as he will hold Q-7, this possibility falls within the realm of guesswork-and the toss of a coin-whether to play the Jack or King-is as effective as any other method.

It is when we come to the 3-1 division, with West holding a singleton queen or ace, that the percentage play is found. If the singleton is the queen, only the king play can save declarer. If the singleton is the ace, the king play is ineffective and declarer goes down. But in such case the Jack is equally ineffective, since East would still have a trump trick coming.
