Begin Temporary Bridge At Montague

The first piles were driven yesterday as the construction of the temporary bridge at Montague got underway. For the past several days materials were being assembled and prepared for the initial undertaking. The first work is being done at the north side of the river near the Johnston cannery factory, and will continue across the river to connect with the property formerly owned by the late Peter Johnston. On this property some fill has been placed to bring the level up to that of the main road. Considerable fill is yet required, but this portion of the work is a minor detail.

The firm of Nove and Rayner, which has the contract of building the bridge estimate that it will be a matter of only a few weeks before this temporary bridge will be completed, and they will then begin their work of erecting the under-structure to the present bridge and the removal of the steel super-structure.
