# UF Objective Up Two Per Cent Despite Higher Costs, Demands

This year's P.E.I. United Fund objective is only a two per cent increase over last year's undiminished target of \$23,000, despite higher costs and greater demands for health and welfare services. The 1964 objective is \$23,462.

The Catholic Social Welfare Bureau, Charlottetown; Prince County Welfare Agency, P.E.I. Protestant Children's Home and the Protestant Family Service Bureau require \$97,061, the largest part of the objective. Last year they received \$73,822.10.

Administration costs are the same as last year's figure, or \$12,815, while campaign costs, because of an expanded public relations program, are up \$309 to \$7,809.

Former tag day agencies will receive \$5,278, the same as last year except for an additional amount of \$10 for the Imperial Order of the Daughters of the Empire, whose allotment was overlooked a year ago.

The 1964 allocation for the YMCA is \$26,630, compared with the amount of \$23,904 they received for 1963. Last year they requested \$25,945.

Budget for the Boy Scouts is \$8,107, while the Girl Guides have been allocated \$4,567. Last year \$4,570 was allocated to the organization, but it received only \$2,940 because of the deficit.

The P.E.I. Red Cross Society has been allocated the same amount as last year; \$24,000. It has been ruled the board of directors will decide what provision will be made to cover the deficit on the 1963 campaign.

Agency allocations for 1964 are as follows with the total amounts paid to agencies under last year's deficit shown in brackets; Canadian Welfare Council - \$1,188 (480); Canadian Red Cross Society \$34,745.00 (\$12,468.70); John Howard Society of P.E.I. - \$309.00 (\$475.00); Boy Scouts of Canada, Prov. Council - \$5,107 (\$7,045.20); Girl Guides of Canada, Prov. Council - \$1,567.00 (\$3,940.00); Navy League of Canada, Prov. District - \$1,000.00 (\$1,001.10); Charlottetown YMCA - \$26,630.00 (\$25,094.50).

## Vanguard Of Armed Units Arrive For Queen's Visit

It is anticipated that about 1,200 members of all the armed forces will be on hand for next week's visit of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth.

Reminiscent of the wartime years, Charlottetown has started to see an influx of military personnel, who will join in a combined operation to ensure the smooth running of official machinery put in motion for the occasion.

Already army vehicles of all types are travelling city streets as approximately 30 professional drivers familiarize themselves with all routes over which the Queen will pass and at the same time learn local traffic regulations. It is expected there will be 40 vehicles, ranging from buses to ground cars, from jeeps to the present day counterpart of the ancient and much maligned 60 hundred weight.

At the same time military work crews are busy on such details as pitching tents. One of them will provide cover for wash basins set up in semi-field conditions for men of the Canadian Guards quartered at HMCS Queen Charlotte. Facilities in the building itself are insufficient to accommodate all the men.

Permanent Army personnel are being quartered right in the old Armouries which is literally jumping with activity as briefing sessions are held daily to acquaint all those arriving with the specific tasks assigned their unit.

One of the tasks the vehicle drivers will have to face will be the transportation of the vast press corps expected to arrive over the weekend. Handling of their baggage alone will be a big job while the men and women of newspapers, television and radio from all over the continent and Europe will have to be provided with immediate transportation as the Queen moves along the chosen routes for the various parades.

In the meantime little change in the physical appearance of the city itself is expected as it has been "dressed up" all Cen-
