### Rangers Get 3-3 Tie With Red Wings On Detroit Ice

DETROIT (AP) — Vic Howe showed his big brother, Gordie how to do it Thursday night, whipping in a 35-foot goal in the third period to give New York Rangers a 3-3 tie with Detroit Red Wings.

The younger Howe, playing only his 13th game in the National Hockey League, capped a New York comeback by beating goalie Terry Sawchuk with a screen shot at 11:57.

Only two minutes earlier, Danny Lewicki put Rangers back into the game by rifling a 40-foot screen shot for his 22nd goal this season. While Vic Howe connected with the key goal of the game, his brother Gordie, star right winger of the Red Wings, drew a blank.

Red Wings, seeking to make it six straight over Rangers on Olympia ice this season, took a 3-1 lead during the first two periods on goals by Bill Dineen, Glen Skov and Dutch Reibel.

Actually, Skov's goal was pure gift as Ranger defenceman Harry Howell knocked the puck into his own net.

Pete Conacher scored New York's first goal in the first period.

### Coach Sees Too Many Penalties

MONTREAL (CP) — Coach Dick Irvin of Montreal Canadiens came home from Wednesday night's 1-1 tie with Toronto Maple Leafs with the crisp comment that penalties made the game "disgusting hockey."

"You may think what you like, and others too, but I think the officials are killing hockey calling all these chippy penalties."

"There were 36 minutes in penalties. People don't pay to see four-man and five-man hockey. In the first two periods there were only four minutes of play with the teams at full strength."

"Frankly, I've never spent such an evening. You are supposed to have body contact in hockey. Now players are afraid to check. They stand around hopeful of avoiding penalties rather than wading in like they used to."

### Track Star Can't Attend Dinner

TORONTO (CP) — Chris Chataway, British track star, sent word to Toronto Thursday that he can't attend the \$25-a-plate sports celebrity dinner for crippled children on Feb. 17.

Chataway said in a wire to the committee in charge: "Much regret that on medical advice have to cancel my visit to Canada."

The man who paced Roger Banister to the world's first four-minute mile last year was to be a star attraction at the dinner sponsored by the Ontario Sports Writers and Sportscasters Association to raise money for the Ontario Society for Crippled Children and to promote sales of eastern seals across Canada.

Fernie Flaman gave Boston a 4-0 edge at 3:38 of the finale with a 50-foot line drive shot, but Chicago's Red Sullivan spoiled John Henderson's bid for a shutout at 5:36 from 15 feet away and Allan Stanley got another on a tip in at 12:04.

After a scoreless first session, the Bruins came to life suddenly in the second as Ferguson got the first of his goals with but 14 seconds gone. The other two scores of the second period came with Chicago short handed.

### Suspension Of Lindsay Upheld

NEW YORK (CP)—The board of governors of the National Hockey League Thursday upheld president Clarence Campbell's decision suspending Ted Lindsay of Detroit for 10 days after he hit a fan with his hockey stick in a game at Toronto last Saturday night.

The governors, at a special meeting called to deal with an appeal by the Red Wings against the suspension, said in a statement: "The decision of the president was upheld. The governors declared their intentions to see that the players do not intentionally interfere with the spectators and the spectators who interfere with the players will be promptly ejected."

"The president was instructed to prepare all necessary regulations to give effect to this policy."

Lindsay's suspension, imposed last Tuesday, will last through Feb. 4. He will miss four games.
