VALUABLE BREEDING STOCK FOR NEW BRUNSWICK.—On the last trip of the barque Onaway to Rockville, West. C., Captain Wilmet brought out with him 3 sheep (valued at \$300) 4 lambs (valued at \$160), and 3 pigs (valued at \$160) for breeding purposes.

THE Rev. Dr. Pope was a passenger by the steamer Sarmatia on Saturday from Rimouski for England. He goes as a delegate from the Conference of New Brunswick and P. E. Island to attend a Methodist Conference in England.

THE St. John Telegraph of the 23rd inst. says the number of strangers in town is larger than in the memory of the "oldest inhabitant." The hotels were all crowded last night, and many persons were lodged in private families.

A CIRCULAR was received at the Mayor's office, a few days ago, from the Mayor of Quebec, asking relief for the sufferers by the late Quebec fire. The matter will, no doubt, receive favorable consideration at the next meeting of Council.

THE Quebec Chronicle states the hay crop of some parts of that Province will be very light. The recent rains came too late to save the crop, as the grass had already been burned out at the roots. Vegetable and root crops are being greatly benefitted by the present wet weather.

FOSTER REPLIES TO JOE. R. LEGGETT'S CHALLENGE.—Leggett lately issued a challenge for walking any man in the Maritime Provinces, from fifteen to 100 miles and Wm. Foster announces that he will walk Leggett from 15 to 25 miles for \$25, the race to take place in a week or ten days.

THE army worm has appeared in the Western States. It is reported to be making havoc in the oat fields of Iowa, and has done much damage in Michigan and Wisconsin. In Iowa and Southern Minnesota the wheat and barley are said to be so much injured that there will be barely a half crop gathered.

ROBBERY.—Yesterday afternoon the Brewery of Mr. Essory, on St. Peter's Road, was entered and a keg of ale containing ten gallons of beer and a number of bottles of ale were stolen therefrom. The thieves on being pursued to the police left their plunder in the woods near the brewery and escaped. They are well known by the officers. To day warrants have been issued for their arrest.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

UNITED STATES.

New York, July 22. The New York Yacht Club sent to the Bay Quinze Club, of Canada, a document American cup, agreeing that only one yacht shall be entered in each of the three races against the Canadian yacht. Nothing has been heard from the Bay Quinze Club since June 30th.

W. I. Hudson, the well known locomotive engineer and inventor, died at Paterson, aged 72.

Rev. Dr. A. B. Van Zandt, of the Theological Seminary, New Brunswick, N. J., died yesterday, aged 60.

LOOKHAVEN, Pa., July 22. The mills of the Pennsylvania Pulp and Paper Co., were burned this morning; loss \$160,000; insurance \$60,000.

HADLYNE, Conn., June 22. A hurricane and hail storm yesterday afternoon was very destructive here; hail fell to the depth of an inch; and rain fell in torrents. Much window glass is broken, and corn, tobacco, fruit and other crops were damaged. Loss, many thousand dollars.

WASHINGTON, July 22. The President's case continues without material change. At 1 p. m. his pulse was 98; temperature 98.4; respiration 18. At 7 p. m. pulse 98; temperature 100.2; respiration 19.

EUROPE AND THE EAST.

LONDON, July 22. Daurbe, Petten & Son, merchants, of Liverpool, have suspended. Liabilities £150,000.

Julius Mosenthal & Co., merchants, London and Paris, have failed.

In the case of Clarke against Bradlaugh, before a special Jury, an action to recover £5000 penalty from defendant for having voted in the House of Commons without taking the Parliamentary oath, the Jury to-day rendered a verdict for the plaintiff.

PARIS, July 22. Mr. Rochefort's organ, Santerme, which has a monopoly of Nihilist news, prints a despatch from St. Petersburg, dated the 18th, which says: "The Nihilist Executive Committee has held a great and solemn meeting, and several exiles came from Geneva to attend it. It was resolved to give the Czar one more warning, and if he does not heed, he and all his pig-headed advisers will perish."

LONDON, July 22. The consideration of the Land Bill in Committee was finished amid loud and prolonged cheers. The Bill was ordered to be reported to the House.
