

Mets Stop Giants Again; Dodgers Defeat Phillies

NEW YORK (AP) — Rookie Bob Gardner limited San Francisco to four hits and Ron Hunt triggered two rallies as the New York Mets whipped Giants 6-1 Sunday in a National League baseball game before a crowd of 35,225.

The Mets, who lost the opener of the series in 17 innings Friday night, cut off the Giants' winning streak at 12 games Saturday with a 17-hit attack and again peppered Giant pitching Sunday for 12 hits and a three-game total of 40.

Hunt went 3-for-5, getting the Mets started with a single in the first inning, stealing second and scoring on a single by Johnny Lewis. He singled again to start a four-run third-inning uprising against Giants starter Gaylord Perry.

Cleon Jones and Ed Kranepool singled in runs in the rally. Johnny Stephenson doubled another home and Ron Swoboda finished it off with a triple.

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Don Sutton and Phil Regan limited Pittsburgh to six hits as the Los Angeles Dodgers defeated the Pirates 3-1 Sunday in the National Baseball League.

Sutton, a rookie right-hander, gained his fifth victory in eight decisions by holding the Pirates in check through seven innings and striking out six. Regan came on in the eighth and finished up.

The loss was the eighth in the last 10 games for the Pirates. The Dodgers scored their first run in the fourth inning on Wes Parker's single and a triple to deep left center by John Roseboro.

In the fifth Maury Wills led off with a bunt and went all the way to second when first baseman Donn Clendenon missed the throw from pitcher Don Cardwell. Wills advanced to third on a balk by Cardwell and scored on Willie Davis' single.

ST. LOUIS (AP) — St. Louis scored two unearned runs in the third inning with the help of Joe Torre's error and went on to defeat Atlanta 5-3 Sunday.

The Cardinals had a 2-1 lead when Orlando Cepeda walked with one out in the third and went to third on a double by Tim McCarver. Charlie Smith grounded to second baseman Frank Bolling, who fired to the plate, ostensibly in time to get Cepeda.

But Torre dropped the ball, allowing Cepeda to score and McCarver to reach third. McCarver came home on Julian Javier's sacrifice fly, which would have been the third out in the inning.

Right hander Art Mahaffey, making his second start as a Cardinal, got his first victory in a year but needed relief help. Mahaffey, who had lost six in a row—five with Philadelphia—since beating the Milwaukee Braves May 14, 1965, left the game with one out in the sixth with a 5-1 lead.

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Harvey Kuenn scored the tying run in the sixth inning, then singled across the lead run in the seventh, as Philadelphia defeated Houston 5-2 Sunday in the National Baseball League.

Larry Jackson, who pitched seven innings before giving way to Jim Bunning, gained his first victory since the Phillies acquired him from the Chicago Cubs earlier this season.

Kuenn beat out an infield single in the sixth inning, raced to third on Bill White's single and scored as Jack Brandt singled. That tied the game 2-2.

In the seventh, Cookie Rojas reached first when his grounder went through Jim Gentile's legs, was sacrificed to second and came home with an unearned run on Kuenn's single to centre field.

The Phillies added two runs in the eighth on a two-run double by Rojas.

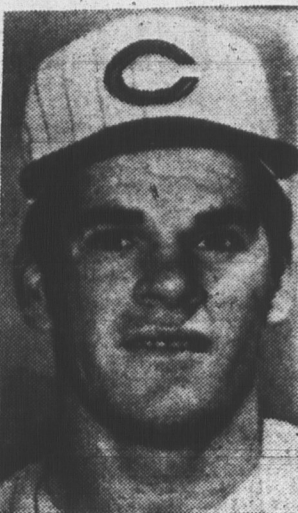

Joe O'Brien Loses Race With Filly

CHICAGO (AP) — All Aflame downed Canadian-bred Armbro Flight, the heavy favorite, for the second time in two weeks to win Washington Park's \$63,000 Lawrence B. Sheppard trot Saturday night.

All Aflame took command at the eighth pole to take a 1 1/2-length triumph in the richest race ever staged at Washington Park in 2:00 4-5, one-fifth of a second less than the track record.

Armbro Flight, favored at 3 to 5, finished third behind a 22-1 outsider, Worthy Scot. Armbro Flight is owned by the Armstrong Brothers of Brampton, Ont.

Only last week, All Aflame, a four-year-old colt, came through with a major upset by beating Armbro Flight in a \$15,000 invitational handicap at Washington. It was the first defeat after 13 consecutive triumphs for the Canadian horse.

All Aflame, driven by George Sholly, paid \$7.20, \$4.00 and \$2.60. Worthy Scot, returned \$9.80 and \$3.00, and Armbro Flight, paid \$2.20.

Plenty of Action At Indy Trials

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. (AP) — A. J. Foyt, 31, qualified a Lotus-Ford Sunday for the 50th Indianapolis 500-mile race May 30.

The Houston driver, twice winner of the 500, crashed against a concrete retaining wall Saturday in his No. 1 car in trials that took the life of Chuck Rodee, a veteran driver.

Foyt's average of 161.355 an hour for the 10-mile run was the best of five Sunday qualifiers who left only 10 spots open for the final qualifications next Saturday and Sunday.

However, he was slower than five of the first-day drivers, topped by Mario Andretti's record 165.899 miles an hour.

One of those qualifying Saturday was Billy Foster, 28, of Victoria, B.C. Foster last year became the first Canadian to qualify for the race.

CLEVELAND (AP) — Dick Howser scored the tie-breaking run on Fred Whitfield's sixth-inning grounder, giving Cleveland Indians a 2-1 victory over Baltimore and a split of their doubleheader Sunday.

The Orioles won the opener 1-0 on Brooks Robinson's run-scoring single in the 13th inning. Lee Stange scattered eight Baltimore hits, including Frank Robinson's fourth-inning homer, in the nightcap for his 11th victory against the Orioles in 13 lifetime decisions.

Robinson's eighth homer of the season tied the score 1-1.

MCNALLY TOOK LOSS — The Indians had scored against southpaw Dave McNally in the third on singles by Del Crandall and Chuck Hinton around a sacrifice bunt.

McNally allowed only seven hits but suffered his first loss after three victories.

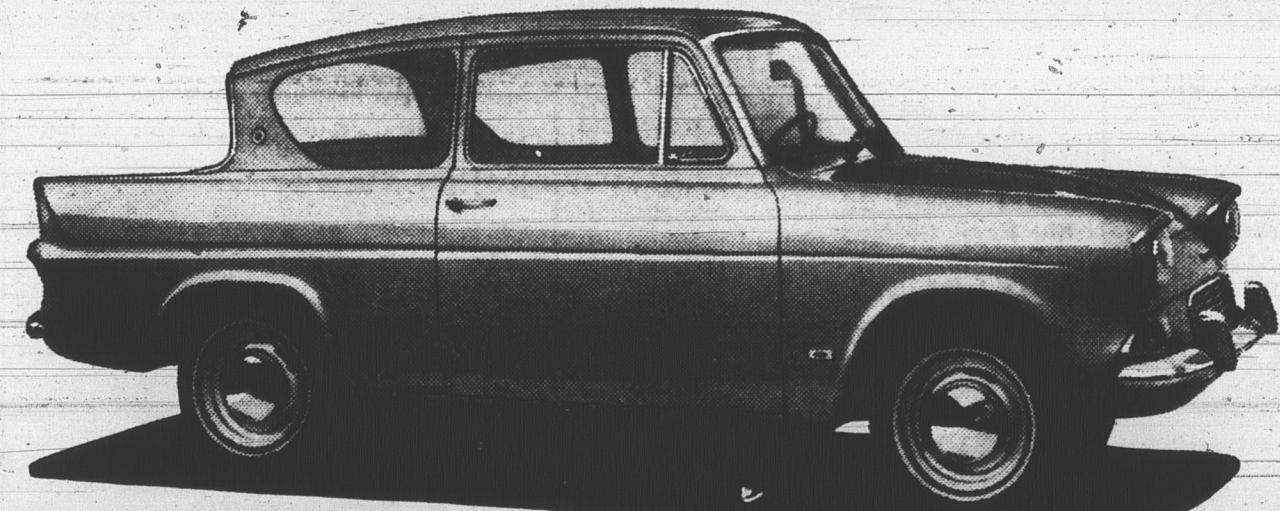
Charlottetown Team Cops Maritime Title

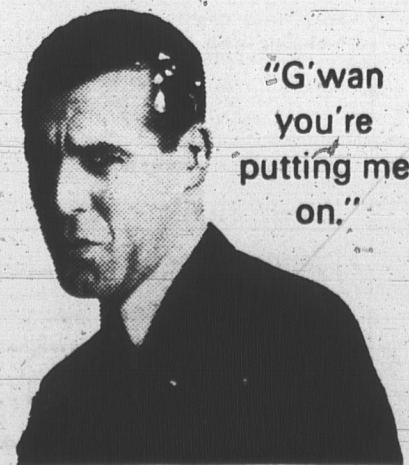

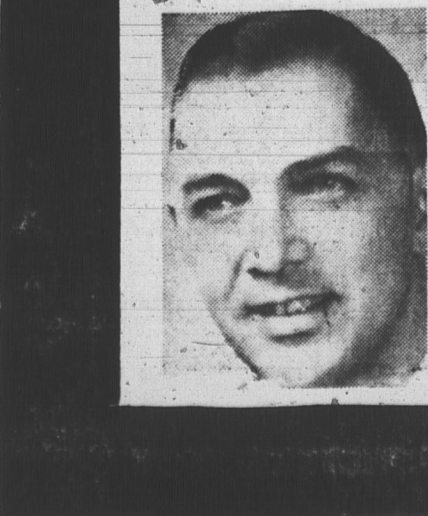
Aubry, backed by a strong assistance from Lionel Brillant, held off Miners with brilliant saves but became swamped.
