Western diplomats, who saw the pendulum of Russian pressure swing eastward after settlement of the Berlin blockade dispute two years ago, are watching now to see whether it is about to swing westward again. Just how far the consolidation of Russian and Chinese Communist interests has gone is still a debatable factor. Communist intentions toward Burma and Indochina, from which they were somewhat diverted by the Korean war, are being closely watched. Chinese nationalist reports of Communist troop concentrations near Indochina received a little more credence recently than they would have before the winner of the Korean truce came up. Despite the Korean war, however, Russia already had been forced to shift a large part of her attention back to Europe because of rearmament there and the prospect that western Germany was about to become an ally in the Atlantic pact program. Western military aid for Yugoslavia was expected to bring its reaction in the European satellites, already bustling rearming. The Cominform is expected to be encouraged to new activity in the west by the failure of French Italian and Finnish elections to produce as great a popular defection from the Communist party as might have been hoped after three years of the Marshall plan and the general hardening of the west's anti-Russian policy. Russia is presently involved in an intensive campaign to make another sphere economically self-sufficient. Involving controls on which areas shall produce what for consumption by whom. But this applies to China as well as to Russia and the European satellites, and in this field the pendulum seems to be balanced. Russia is playing a sly game in Iran, doing nothing which might encourage American intervention in favor of the British. The Tudeh party, outlawed Communist fifth column there, is content for the moment to walk strictly under the guise of nationalism, awaiting the day when Iran may come apart as the result of chaos in the oil industry; and so open the door to infiltration. The pendulum could easily swing from the Far East to the Middle East if such a moment arrives. Russia started some more economic trouble in Berlin just recently, and in their anxiety to clean it up Allied officials allowed themselves to be maneuvered into new four-power talks. Moscow's design, of course, was to use them for continuation of the tug-of-war over Germany which was recently adjourned in Paris. Whether she intends to renew real trouble in Berlin, however, is a matter of conjecture. At any rate, Russia can be counted upon not to let her disturbing energies lie idle. If they are not needed in Korea, they will be applied somewhere else. Russia has never yet envisioned the possibilities—and this factor may yet prove to have been the saviour of the west—of letting things get quiet and taking advantage of the democratic tendency to go to sleep."
