Helped Start Potato Growers Association

of the highlights, as soon as I can get time to do the necessary research.

Mr. MacFayden seconded the motion to form the Potato Growers Association - the late A.E. MacLean had moved it - and he was the first man to pay his membership fee. The meeting was held in the Board of Trade rooms in the old Market Building that was destroyed by fire a few years ago. It stood where the Confederation Centre stands now. The date was Monday, April 19, 1920. Mr. MacFayden was a director until the time of his death in 1937. He was vice-

president for Primes in the early years.

Mr. MacLean, incidentally became Member of Parliament for Prince County in 1921 and held that riding through the 1935 election. He would have held it indefinitely, from what I have heard about the man, except for his death before the next election. In 1940 Mr. MacLean - he's still talked of in Prince County, particularly among his Liberals - ran up the largest majorities of his time. His 4,176-vote margin in 1935 was the biggest ever recorded in the riding. It compares, for example, with the 3,800 Dr. Orville Phillips scored in 1938, the year of the Dielenbaker sweep.

was for anything that was good for the Island. He played a leading role in the fight to get the Borden - Tormentine ferry service established, the Guardian editorial said.

From old files I have read, I've learned that he hired a special train once to take a group of people from his general area to attend a meeting in Emerald where the ferry was discussed. That was about 1908 or 1909, I understand. It was in March though there is some doubt about the actual year.

On another occasion Mr. MacFayden hired a special train to Charlottetown to attend a meeting on the same ferry project. I imagine that the Augustin Cove man got back most of the money he put up as a guarantee to the railway, but he was the one who sparked the effort.

Mr. MacFayden was known to many as "the father of the ferry". The service was established in 1917.

More than 80 years ago he was studying the prospects of developing the cranberry and blueberry industries. Only failing health in the latter years of his life, one biographer said, prevented him from personally demonstrating the possibility of developing high grade products in both berries. This revelation alone put Mr. MacFayden years ahead of his time. It has only been in recent years that the development of these berries has been undertaken on a major scale.

URGED GOOD PLOWING

Mr. MacFayden, my research tells me, preached the gospel of good plowing. He noted that 40,000 people attended the international plowing match in Ontario - that was more than 37 years ago - thus "outdrawing hockey, baseball, football, etc. without any ballhoop."

"Of all the operations on the farm," he said, "plowing is the most important. Here it is that the earliest improvement of modern agricultural techniques have been displayed."

The Augustine Cove farmer made several trips to Long Island, N.Y. and to Anse-au-Loup, Maine at his own expense, to learn how the potato growers there had organized their industry, as he built up the groundwork for the Potato Growers Association here.

Not surprisingly he had encountered difficulties in his efforts to stir interest and promote the idea of the carryover system of the old Guardians. I read that Mr. MacFayden had been writing to his federal MP for sometime, without receiving a reply. The MP was in favor of the tunnel, the old story said. So Mr. MacFayden started registering his letters. Then he got replies.

The Guardian said editorially back in 1917 that this man had been "the brains and the moving spirit in most of the progressive movements in agriculture."

Price Index Is Higher In Ten Cities

OTTAWA (CP) - Consumer price indexes went up in all 10 regional cities in November with increases ranging from one-fifth of one per cent in Vancouver to 1.8 per cent in Ottawa, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics has reported.

The cost of food - most important of the indexes' seven components - rose in all 10 cities. Increases varied between four-fifths of one per cent in Saskatoon-Regina and Vancouver and 3.2 per cent in Ottawa and Toronto.

The health and recreation indexes were up in nine cities, except in Montreal and St. John's, Nfld., respectively.

St. John's was also the only city where the cost of clothing went down. It held constant in Saint John, N. B., and Saskatoon-Regina, and rose in the seven other cities.

The transportation and housing indexes showed mixed movements, while the cost of tobacco and alcohol held steady in eight cities and showed slight decreases in Montreal and Vancouver.

PORT ELIZABETH (AP) - A South African witch doctor on trial for theft told the magistrates he would bring a dead man back to life by Jan. 9 and call him as a defence witness.

So the magistrate has adjourned the case until Jan. 11 to give him a chance to try.

The witch doctor, Wilson Rodio, 30, is accused of taking money and clothes worth \$56 from a Negro woman, Mrs. Eah Suluba, as payment after he promised to bring her dead son back to life.

Mrs. Suluba told the court she gave Rodio the cash and clothes in September, but never saw him - or her son - again.
