

# Curranites Edge Dodgers 4-2 In Exhibition Game

The Curran and Briggs Juniors from Summerside made their first appearance of the season in Charlottetown an impressive one yesterday afternoon as they shaded W. G. Barbour's Dodgers 4-2 in an exhibition baseball game on Memorial Field.

The Curranites scored two unearned runs in the second inning and added two more of the earned variety in the sixth frame to whip the Dodgers who were formerly known as the Intermediate Abbies.

The Dodgers scored both their runs in the seventh inning on two singles and a costly error at third base. Both Dodgers runs were unearned.

Coke Grady, better known in Island junior circles as a shortstop, pitched for the visitors and allowed only five singles as he silenced the big bats of the Dodgers. Grady had perfect control as he did not issue a base on balls or strike a batter. Only three Dodgers were left on the base paths during the game.

Donnie MacLean pitched for the Dodgers and during the early part of the game had trouble with his control. He allowed eleven hits but the only damaging blow was Grant Grady's two run double in the sixth inning. Coke Grady obtained the Curranites other extra-base blow, a double in the same frame. MacLean struck out seven and walked six.

The Curranites came up with two runs after two men had been retired in the second inning. Big Gord Grady walked to open the inning but Cannon and Dalton were retired before Grady reached first on an error and Grady scored. Peter Green rapped out a single, Coke Grady and Grant Grady received walks to force home Gillis with the visitors' second run.

There were also two men out in the sixth when the Curranites scored again. Green was safe on a fielders choice, Coke Grady doubled into left field and Grant Grady delivered his game winning double into left centre to score the two Grads.

The Dodgers came up with two runs in the last of the seventh. Buck Whitlock and Eddy Lund hit back-to-back singles. Ralph Pineau hit the ball back to the pitcher and Coke Grady attempted to force the third baseman dropped the ball allowing Whitlock and Lund to score.

# Cleveland Bolsters Lead; Brooklyn Gains On New York

New York Giants' National League lead was chipped to 3 1/2 games Sunday when the Giants split while Brooklyn won, but Cleveland maintained its 4 1/2 game margin over the favored New York Yankees in the American at the traditional July 4th dividing line.

Sid Gordon's three-run pinch homer enabled Pittsburgh to pull out the second game with the Giants 7-6 after New York slammed them out a 9-2 victory in the opener.

Brooklyn blasted Robin Roberts for four runs in the 10th inning to down Philadelphia 5-3 although the Phils came back with two off Carl Erskine in their half of the extra inning.

Cleveland got no-hit pitching from Mike Garcia, rookie Ray Narleski and Early Wynn for 8 2/3 innings in beating Chicago 2-1. Minnie Minoza broke the charm with a single after two were out in the ninth. He was out stealing to end the game. Larry Doby drove in both runs with his 15th homer and a single.

**SWEEP SERIES**  
The Indians' sweep of the important four-game series left the slumping White Sox in third place, seven full games off the pace.

New York matched strides with the Indians by blanking Washington 3-0 on rookie Bob Grim's first major league shutout. # Aussies Win Doubles Match At Wimbledon With Ease

**WIMBLEDON, England (AP)** — A pair of grim, unsmiling Australians made U. S. chances of winning back the Davis Cup look dim as they won the Wimbledon men's doubles tennis title with supreme ease Saturday.

Max Hartwig and Mervyn Rose, top-seeded in the doubles, scored a 6-4, 6-4, 3-6, 6-4 victory over Vic Seixas of Philadelphia and Tony Trabert of Cincinnati, who were seeded second.

The rout was the final chapter in the all but total collapse of U.S. men's tennis hopes at the 68th Wimbledon.

The American girls, however, distinguished themselves as usual. Maureen Connolly of San Diego, Calif., won her third consecutive Wimbledon singles, defeating Louis Kron Rosewall, 6-2, 6-1, 6-2, 7-5.

Miss Brough later teamed with Mrs. Margaret Dupont of Wilmington, Del., to defeat Shirley Fry of Akron, Ohio, and Doris Hart of Coral Gables, Fla., 4-6, 9-7, 6-3 in the women's doubles.

**DROBY WINS**  
The setback by the Americans in the men's doubles followed their elimination from the singles which was won by Jaroslav Droby, the self-exiled Czech, over Australia's Ken Rosewall.

In the doubles, Trabert played creditable tennis and in the last two sets was the best man on the court. But Seixas had another of the bad days which have plagued him ever since he won the 1953 Wimbledon singles.
