

# Quebec Asbestos Has Long Future

ASBESTOS, Que. (CP)—Large current expenditures will ensure asbestos mining as a major Quebec industry for at least another century. It is predicted in an industry statement.

Millions of dollars are being poured into expansion and development programs in Quebec's asbestos belt which already supplies some 70 per cent of the world's asbestos fibres. Companies have spent or now are spending \$75,000,000 in expanding and improving mine-mill operations in the Asbestos, Thetford Mines, Black Lake and East Broughton districts of the Eastern Townships.

The 5,000 asbestos workers produce approximately one-third of Quebec's entire mineral output, the statement said.

Canadian Johns-Manville Limited, which produces more than half the asbestos mined in Canada, has put into operation the first section of the biggest mill in the world. The second half of the project is well under way, the company reports.

**OTHERS EXPAND**

Last summer, the Johnson Company of Thetford Mines completed its \$8,000,000 Megantic mine project at Black Lake and at East Broughton.

Quebec Asbestos Corporation is starting work on its new \$7,000,000

Carey mine, mill and transmission line.

Scheduled for early next year is the official opening of the new Normandie mine of Asbestos Corporation Limited. More than \$14,000,000 has been spent on this project which includes a modern mill. The actual works expansion, however, is only part of the region-wide program. In Thetford Mines, three asbestos companies are spending \$5,000,000 on a relocation job which involves the moving of entire streets of shops and dwellings, a new railway line and station, a relocated highway and a new church.

A similar program will become necessary in this town, the industry says.

## Sheppard Tells of Women in Life Before Wife's Murder

CLEVELAND (AP)—Dr. Samuel Sheppard Monday told of three women in his life, before his wife's murder. One he dated, one he kissed, one he made love to.

The serious affair was with Susan Hayes.

The 30-year-old Osteopath also testified his 31-year-old wife, Marilyn, lost "sexual aggressiveness" after the birth of their son Chip, now a seven-year-old. She worried, he added, that she was "losing my attention."

However, Dr. Sheppard said: "There was no question in my mind of divorce or separation."

Dr. Sheppard is on trial, charged with murdering his wife last July 4.

Assistant prosecutor John J. Mahon had Dr. Sheppard describe how he used to take Miss Hayes home when the 24-year-old beauty was a laboratory technician in his hospital in 1932.

**ADMITS RELATIONS**

"You had intimate relations with her, didn't you?" Mahon asked. "Yes, sir," replied Dr. Sheppard, confirming for the first time in the long trial Miss Hayes' story of a 15-month illicit romance.

Dr. Sheppard also testified about a kissing date with Mrs. Julie Lossman in 1933.

She was the 27-year-old wife of a dealer who sold him a sports car.

## Death of Former Island Man in Fredericton, N.B.

A former Prince Edward Island man William D. MacPherson, who became a widely known New Brunswick building contractor died in Victoria Public Hospital, Fredericton on Saturday, December 4.

He was born in Caledonia, P.E.I., a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Murdoch MacPherson, and lived at Hartland before coming to Fredericton in 1926.

He was a member of the firm of MacPherson and Myles Construction Co. Ltd., a former secretary of the New Brunswick Contractors' Association and a former associate of Forbes and Brown Contractors.

Some of the buildings he had part in constructing are: the New Brunswick Power Commission Building in Fredericton, Nashwaakasis Memorial School and the Bonar Law-Bennett Library at University of New Brunswick.

Mr. MacPherson died in hospital after brief illness. He is survived by his wife the former Sadie McKenna of Fredericton; two sons, Stewart and Bruce, Nashwaakasis; one daughter, Mrs. David Boone, Fredericton; and two granddaughters. One brother, Daniel MacPherson, lives in Caledonia, P. E. I., also surviving are two sisters, Mrs. Donald MacLellan, Woodstock, and Mrs. Effie MacLellan, Charlottetown, P.E.I.
