

**High Jinks at Halifax.**

The coming season will be one of great excitement in society circles in Halifax—the most interesting for many years. A large number of Upper Province and American visitors have already signified their intention of spending the summer in Halifax, being induced to do so probably by the statement that His Excellency Lord Lotne and H. R. H. the Princess Louise and suite will spend a part of the season there. But, besides these, the two sons of the Prince of Wales, Princes Victor and George, will visit that port in H. M. S. Bacchante, now at Jamaica. His Royal Highness Prince Leopold will, it is reported, pay a visit to this continent, and of course, will be in Halifax. His Grace the Duke of Beaufort, Sir John Reid and Mr. Sothorn, the great actor, are to spend several weeks fishing on the Metapediae. They will visit the city, and it is possible Mr. Southern may be induced to give a performance at the Academy. Mrs. Major DeWinton and family are to spend the summer there. Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Kenny and Col. and Mrs. Freemantle are expected to return from England early in June. Mrs. (Major) and Miss Leigh will shortly return from Bermuda. The Admiralty House will be cleaned, refurnished and put in thorough repair for the reception of Sir Leopold and Lady McClintock.

**Franco and Russia.**

The escape of the Nihilist, Hartmann, to France and the refusal of the latter country to give him up is likely to have momentous political consequences. It has entirely dissolved the cordial relations which existed between France and Russia, which were considered at one time so menacing to Germany. The alliance between a Government like that of France and the despotism of the Czar was an unnatural one, but no person expected that it would be brought to so speedy a termination. It would be strange if Bismarck did not take advantage of the fair opportunity thus unexpectedly placed in his way. He is already patching up his difficulties with the Vatican, and a very able statesman has observed that when Bismarck made peace with the Pope Europe might look out for another war. It is significant that our despatches not only contained further particulars of the irritation between France and Russia, but also told of the progress of the negotiations between Bismarck and the Vatican. Few will believe that this was wholly an unintentional coincidence.

The other day, over at the Alameda baths, a timid and retiring looking man waited until the superintendent was discharged, and then said to him:

"I do hate to give anyone trouble, but have you a long stick or pole of any kind you could lend me?"

"No, sir; I told you so ten minutes ago," snapped the overdriven official.

"So you did," replied the man; "but I thought I'd just ask once more. I guess, now, I've done my duty in the matter. Don't you think so?"

"What matter? What on earth are you talking about?"

"Why, you see, mother-in-law dived off down there at the deep end about half an hour ago, and as she hasn't come up yet I thought I'd like to tell my wife that I had sorter jibbed round on the bottom for her awhile anyway, but if I can't, that's all." And pensively writing her address on a tag, to be tied to the old lady when she came up, the conscientious man walked thoughtfully away. —San Francisco Post.

A Des Moines special says there has long existed a deadly feud between the Howey and Westfall families in Warren county, Iowa. It resulted in a murderous shooting affray two years ago, and has now broken out afresh. Last Wednesday Reuben Westfall, while out looking for his hogs, was shot in the head by some person in ambush. The ball struck just above the ear, but glanced on the skull, making only a slight wound. On the 20th, one George Wheeler was arrested on suspicion, and confessed that he had been hired by the Howeys to shoot the entire Westfall family at \$100 per head, and when the last one was disposed of he was to have \$200 extra. Wheeler's statement was confirmed by circumstances, and on its strength four of the Howeys have been arrested, with two others of their gang. The remainder cannot be found at present.

Two men from Maine, recently made search in a cemetery near Dwight, Ill., for a treasure-box, said to have been buried there seven years ago by a Swedish adventurer. After a few hours' search the box was found buried at the foot of a certain grave, and under a hard maple tree, which had marks and figures cut deep in the bark. The box contained the will of one Edward Freese, deeds to property near Brooklyn, thought to be worth about \$6,000, and nearly \$2,000 in money and jewelry. It is said that Freese, on his death-bed, made a statement that he had buried the box in the cemetery near Dwight, where at one time he lived.

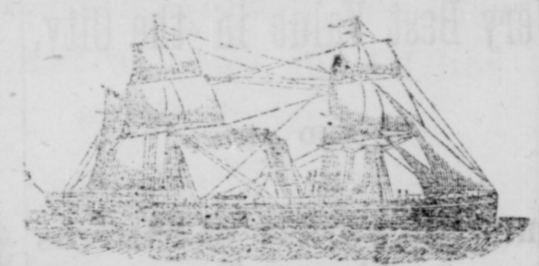

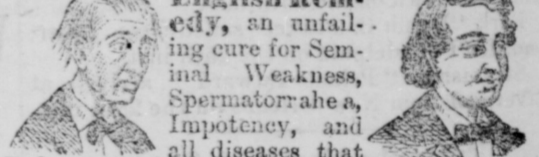
