

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4. Some delay was caused in the proceedings of the Giteau trial to-day while Scoville was preparing an affidavit. Giteau as soon as he had taken his seat said "This is a good time to make a speech, but I promised the Marshal that I would keep quiet to-day, so I will try to do so."

NEWARK, N. J., Jan. 4. City Auditor Fred A. Palmer, in court to-day, pleaded guilty to eight indictments for forgery. He was remanded.

LONDON, Jan. 4. John Bright, Chancellor of the duchy of Lancaster, and Joseph Chamberlain, President of the Board of Trade, spoke at Birmingham yesterday. The former traced the cause of Irish dissatisfaction to the long course of misrule, and justified coercive measures on the ground of their absolute necessity.

DUBLIN, Jan. 4. The police have seized at Kilmish a box containing 80 rifles and bayonets, and 450 rounds of ammunition. Messrs. Givan and Dickson, members of Parliament, are making arrangements for a series of meetings of tenant farmers in Ulster.

THE Amir of Afghanistan arrived at Cabul on the 18th December.

HANLAN has cabled \$100 to the widow of Drewitt, his English trainer.

SIR HENRY ERNEST BULWER has been appointed Governor of Natal.

WALLACE ROSS intends shortly to leave for England, for the purpose of taking part in the coming aquatic events there.

A STATE portrait of Queen Victoria has been presented to the Mikado of Japan by Her Majesty's Government.

EMPEROR WILLIAM OF GERMANY has received congratulations from the Czar of Russia on the seventy-fifth anniversary of his entrance into the army.

J. W. GITEAU believes that his brother will be hanged before Feb. 1, but from present appearances the trial will not be concluded much before that time.

It is understood that Mr. Bradlaugh will appear before the bar of the House of Commons at the re-assembling of Parliament, and make a claim to have the oath administered.

THE Hon. Sir James Fitzjames Stephen, one of the justices of the Queen's bench division of the supreme Court of judicature, will succeed the Right Hon. Sir Robert Lush as Lord Justice of appeal.

THE death is announced of W. C. Little, M. P., who has represented South Simcoe, Ont., in the Commons from 1867 to the date of his death.

At Dublin a day or two ago Mr. Dawson was inaugurated Lord Mayor. The corporation, by 28 to 18, refused to pass the customary vote of thanks to Mr. Moyer, the retiring Lord Mayor, in consequence of his refusal to convene a special meeting to confer the freedom of the city on Messrs. Parnell and Dillon.

THE Princess of Wales has set in England one excellent fashion. She has made so public a display of her attachment to her young sons and daughters that it has become the mode for the fashionable British matron similarly to express her affections.

JOHN H. MURRAY, the well-known circus proprietor and manager, died in New York on Dec. 27, aged 53 years. When 20 years of age he entered the circus business with S. B. Howes, as a general performer. Up to 1872 he followed the business, both in this country and Europe, as performer, manager and joint proprietor.
