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## Tribune Hurst And Westlock To Meet In Golf Finals

SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP)—Bert Tribune of Vancouver celebrated the birthday of his two-year-old son Bret Friday by advancing through a two-round of the Canadian amateur golf championship for a meet with veteran Nick Westlock of Toronto in Saturday's 9-hole final.

Tribune eliminated Kelli Alexander of Calgary, 1960 champion, 3 and 1 in the morning and then won handily over 19-year-old Bob Jamieson of Peterborough, Ont., 4 and 3 in the afternoon semi-final.

Westlock, 1957 title winner, was a little less authoritative than usual in his wins but made sure things never got out of control.

Nick won 2 and 1 over Bob Simpson of Ottawa, who put a fine game against his formidable opponent. In the semi-final, Westlock was carried to the 18th green by getting past the 17th hole in 28 strokes. Draper of Royal Oak, Mich.

The galleries of nearly 1,000 over the Riverside course were from one match to the other in the semi-finals but finally collapsed on a dramatic Westlock-Draper tussle.

Draper, a one-hole lead at the fourth, but lost the seventh, eighth and ninth and could never catch up although he trimmed the margin to a single hole over the back nine.

At the post-three 10th Draper hit the front edge of the green with his tee shot and Westlock was in a slight fairway depression 50 feet short of the green.

Nick calmly chipped six inches from the pin. Draper, needing to sink a 30-foot putt to keep the match alive, was six feet short.

Draper pulled off a sensational putt over the top of the par-five fourth hole to move in front. Westlock was in almost perfect position after his second shot, 25 yards to the left of the green.

Draper's lift over 30-foot-high maple trees left him less than 100 feet from the pin. Nick walked six feet away and missed his putt.

Westlock got even at the seventh, where Draper's second shot carried into the woods, won the eighth with an eight-foot birdie putt and took the ninth when Draper put his drive back in a tree.
