many beneficial acts we have passed were it not an indication of what you might expect of us in the future if we are returned to office.

"Also I would like to mention the lack of any specific criticism after sixteen years in office. It is most remarkable and possibly some kind of a record in government. Speaking specifically for the past eight years when I have been Premier I may say that success has been achieved because Ministers worked harder at their jobs, because competent deputies were appointed, because there was little thought of playing politics, and because new ideas in service were being constantly proposed.

"Many things were accomplished which were not exactly necessary but which turned out to be of considerable public service. Take the Maple Hills Housing Project, which it will be agreed, was in considerable of a mess when our Government was appointed to it. We went in, managed the project successfully for a couple of years, bought the assets and finally managed to clear up the whole project without cost to the country. We also managed to have three hangers brought to a point near Charlottetown where two are rebuilt into possibly the finest fertilizer plant in Eastern Canada and the other is a splendid government garage.

"Or take Mt. Pleasant airport which was stripped and had deteriorated. That property was bought and sales made until it will cost the country nothing and the Government owns 710 acres of land with other useful and saleable assets and can put the western road back where it was formerly located. We may also bring to the Exhibition grounds a hangar which will serve for a coliseum.

"Or take the Hillsborough Bridge which must be rebuilt. A new bridge has been bought at one-third the usual cost-and someone is going to save nearly a million dollars on this deal. "Do the farmers remember the year 1943 when no clover seed could be obtained? Our Government got it after the dealers failed. Do they also remember when there was only one veterinary surgeon on Prince Edward Island and the Government went to Ontario and brought one back? Do they also remember when 80,000 chickens died with Pullorum disease and another doctor was brought in, provided with a first class laboratory, and cleared up the disease? Do farmers remember when the nematode trouble came into a certain potato area and our potatoes were outlawed for shipment for seed? Well we quarantined the area, paid the price, and in a few years cleaned up a threat to the potato industry of Prince Edward Island.

"We don't want to brag too much but many will recall Adam Borsch and his experience in Prince Edward Island during a meat packers' strike. Even then the Sydney, Nova Scotia, organized labour bodies passed a resolution not to eat Prince Edward

Island pork-which is proved to be the best in the world. Hurling themselves is an old custom in Sydney.

"Most of you remember the Beech Grove Inn which was a military establishment during the last war and afterwards reverted to the Sterns Estate. We bought it from the latter's agents for \$17,000. Then by swapping and selling land and in other ways we secured it for less than nothing and then rebuilt it into an old folks' home. I think it is now agreed that this is a necessary, desirable and beautiful home for lonely and neglected old folks to live in.

"The Falconwood nurses formerly lived in the institution with the patients. We bought a building from War Assets cheaply-hauled it in sections to Falconwood, made one wing into a beautiful nurses' home; another wing into an adjunct to the men's residence; another wing was made into an occupational therapy centre, and still another wing into a henhouse and also a manager's residence.

"Improved Terminals "I could go on with a description of things we have done and things we would like to do, but time will not suffice. But I do recall with pleasure, the time we interfered at Borden and Tormentine, secured General Ferguson as a referee engineer and designed the improved docks and harbours at both places. There is nothing we have accomplished which is as satisfactory or important as the dock improvements at Tormentine and Borden, and there are more improvements to be effected at those points.

"I doubt that the Progressive Conservatives made an improve-

ment by changing the Leaders. The former leader was promptly and continuously in his seat during the session and brought into the debate a wealth of experience and sound judgment. In contrast the new leader was nearly always late and did not seem to be organized. His questions on the order paper did not come in until the last days of the session and he allowed his supporters to let the important Budget debate drop after his own speech. It was as if there was nothing to say after the Provincial Treasurer made his speech and presumably nothing to criticize.

"In requesting a renewal of mandate for the Liberal Party I do so because I know there are many things to do which are only begun. I shall not enumerate them in a platform here because often publicity will hinder rather than advance the cause. "I have in mind at present particularly a claim worth a couple of millions which I believe could be consummated by us. I have in mind many other things that can be accomplished.

"It is as if we humbly ask for your renewal of faith in us to keep the Ship of State "Steady as she goes", which was the slogan in the last election. At that time the ship sailed on true to course, under favourable trade winds.

"If you want to be becalmed, then ride out hurricanes and maybe get wrecked or torpedoed, don't vote for us. Vote for our opponents and do it all the next election or until they can get themselves organized under a real good leader. I hope they will be able to do that as I believe in having a good strong loyal Opposition."
