John A. McCurdy Is Director Of Canadian Aircraft Firm

ARNPRIOR, Ont. — The Hon. John A. D. McCurdy has been elected a director of Canadian Vertol Aircraft, Ltd., it has been announced by Kenneth R. Patrick, chairman of the board.

"The election of Mr. McCurdy," Patrick stated, "is a further step in the program to provide an increase in Canadian participation in the management of Canadian Vertol, a subsidiary of Vertol Aircraft Corporation of Morton, Pennsylvania, and in the company's plans for the eventual Canadian production of the Vertol 107 twin turbine helicopter."

A well-known figure in Canadian aviation, McCurdy holds the honor of being the first British subject to fly a heavier than air machine in the British Empire. On February 23, 1908, at Baddeck Bay, Nova Scotia, McCurdy piloted the "Silver Dart", an airplane developed by the Aerial Experimental Association which counted Dr. Alexander Graham Bell, Glenn H. Curtiss, F.W. Baldwin and L. Thomas Selfridge among its members.

During the First World War McCurdy was responsible for the training of hundreds of pilots who saw service in the Royal Flying Corps and in the Royal Navy Aeronautical Service. In the post-war years he served as

the senior executive of an aircraft company. In 1939 he entered government service as assistant director general of aircraft production.

McCurdy was appointed Lieutenant-Governor of Nova Scotia, his native province, in 1947 and served in that position until his retirement in 1952.

SUMMERSIDE — The case of the thief in a quilt is under investigation by Summerside police as the result of a prowler breaking into the apartment of Mrs. Harry Francis, Central Street, Monday evening and leaving behind the cover of a quilt.

Mrs. Francis, who is confined to a wheelchair was alone at the time watching TV and didn't see the prowler enter the residence located in the basement at rear of the home of Morley M. Bell.

However when making his departure he threw a quilt from one

of the beds over his head and started doing an Indian war dance, whooping it up and jumping up and down. Mrs. Francis grabbed the quilt as the intruder swept past her chair but he held on tight and pulled Mrs. Francis to the floor. He kept on going out the door where he threw down the quilt and disappeared in the darkness.

Investigation showed the burglar had ransacked the bedroom, kitchen and bathroom but nothing appeared to be missing. Money was believed to be the object of the search.

Police Officer Harry MacKay investigated the odd burglary which occurred around 8:30 in the evening.

West Prince Trade Board Objects To Phone Service

An investigation into the inadequate telephone service in West Prince County was called for at the regular meeting of Alberton and West Prince Board of Trade last night. A committee of five members was appointed to meet with officials of the provincial governments and the Public-Utilities Commission to press for improvements.

Committee members are, Edwin Turner, Harold Phillips, Edward Gaudet, Fred Peters and Harvey Hutt.

It was generally agreed that inadequate equipment was the main cause of dissatisfaction with the present service and one member stated there were 50 phones or one community line in his area.

A request by the board some time ago a dial system in O'Leary and Alberton was turned down by the utilities commission.

PICNIC SITES
Picnic sites, trailer camps and tenting areas came up for discussion and it was noted that the new site at Bloomfield was the only one west of Summerside.

The secretary, C. R. Leard considered that at least four more such sites should be established and a number of suitable locations discussed.

A motion was approved requesting electric lighting facilities at Canes Hill camping area.

FERRY PLANS DISCUSSED
The plans for new Borden ferry came under strong criticism by Harry Pridham for not being an ice breaker or having rails for loading railway cars.

"It is only a \$3,000,000 tourist boat," he said, and if anything should happen to the Abegweit the province would have serious transportation difficulties.

Ed Turner advised the meeting that the proposed ferry service at West Point is being revived and will be brought up at the next board meeting. "Even if a causeway is eventually built," he said, "it could take 15 years and we must look ahead."

Correspondence included a request from a Boston firm for a list of suppliers and packers of Irish moss, kelp and seaweed. Motions were approved supporting a proposed improvement to a trout stream at Mill River, the opening of a number of public roads leading to shore areas, and a system of compulsory public liability insurance for motor vehicles.
