Predicts Liberal Sweep For King's

OTTAWA, April 9 —(Special) — T. J. Kichham, Liberal member for Kings is today busily collecting additional ammunition for use in the P. E. I. Provincial election campaign this month. Mr. Kichham told The Guardian that he will speak on the Budget debate later in the month if circumstances indicate the need of a Prince Edward Island spokesman. At the present time, however, he is more deeply concerned with aiding the Provincial Liberal candidates in King's County, he admitted. Speaking to The Guardian this afternoon, Mr. Kichham said: "I freely forecast a blackout in King's County for the newly-elected leader of the Conservative party. The reasons for my firm belief in this are, first, that our

people in King's County could not be persuaded to believe that Mr. Bell could in any way obtain for the Province at Ottawa the broad financial program now in the process of negotiation with the Federal Government, replacing the past five-year provincial tax agreement. "Secondly, the people have already greatly benefited through the administration of the Jones Government's complete co-operation and co-ordination with the Government at Ottawa in the fields of health and welfare, physical fitness, education, vocational training, improved roads, assistance to the fishing industry, and in providing frost-proof potato storage warehouses, cold storage for fish bait, cheese and fruits. "Thirdly, people are not unmindful of the generosity of the Federal Government in providing funds for the maintenance and construction of frost-proof potato storage warehouses for the potato growers, dredging harbors, and construction and repairs for the fishermen's boat harbors and

breakwaters. "The electors are fully aware of the Progressive effectiveness of the Jones' administration and his personal determination to have for his people as fruitful and economic a future as may be found anywhere in Canada." Mr. Kichham will leave Ottawa Thursday or Friday to return to King's County and plunge into the thick of the electoral fray there.

During the reading of the correspondence it was learned that the site of the Irving Oil tanks would be fenced in the near future, and the dyke repaired. The town policeman was instructed by the council to collect dog taxes for the year 1950.

The building committee was instructed to look into the need of having the town building cleaned. It was moved that \$10.00 be paid to Mrs. Fred Webster for damage done to trellis during Halloween night last year. It was moved that Mrs. Minnie MacDonald be appointed as auditor for the year 1950.

The clerk was instructed to forward to the Clerk of the County Court, Georgetown, the accounts against those in arrears for connections to the main sewerage, with further instructions to issue summons and place same in hands of the deputy sheriff for service.
