## Report Good Demand For Canadian Rags In Germany

OTTAWA (CP)—West Germany apparently is impressed with Canada's rags.

The United States still takes more Canadian rags than any other country, but I. V. Macdonald, assistant Canadian commercial secretary at Bonn, reports that "the excellent quality of Canadian woolen rags has created a steadily increasing demand for them in the West German market."

"It seems possible," he adds, "that West Germany may eventually become Canada's best customer for rags."

The rag is reconverted to hody for low-grade clothing. The rag business of Canadian exporters has risen this year. Last year they shipped a total of "300,000 worth abroad."

The bureau of statistics reports that in the first six months this year \$1,400,000 worth of cotton and wool rags were exported, compared with \$1,147,000 in the same period of 1954 and \$1,227,000 in the first six months of 1953.

## Another Firm Hikes Newsprint

VANCOUVER (CP)—A three per cent boost in newsprint prices to Canadian and United States publishers was announced Saturday by M. J. Foley, president of Powell River Sales Co. Ltd.

Mr. Foley said the new price, effective Nov. 15, would increase prices from \$4 to \$4.50 per ton. Basic price now is \$122 in Canada and \$126 in the U.S.

Powell River supplies its newsprint mainly to British Columbia and U.S. users. It is the fourth Canadian paper company to raise its price in the last 10 days.

The St. Lawrence Corp. first increased its price by \$5 a ton; Abitibi went up \$5 and Canadian International Paper Co. increased \$4.

Crown Zellerbach Canada Ltd., other major paper manufacturer in B. C., has made no announcement. Company officials were not immediately available for comment.

### SITUATION FAVORABLE

THE HAGUE, The Netherlands Reuters)—A S. Tuinman, Dutch emigration attaché in Ottawa, said Thursday the situation is "exceptionally favorable now for immigrants to Canada."

Tuinman, visiting here, told a reporter that ease can be increased, he said, as the help of admission requirements had helped the situation for Dutch immigrants.

## Recent N.Y. Stock Market Trend Sometimes Baffling

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market had a change of pace last week and sometimes baffling performance.

The great fall off by President Eisenhower's illness hit bottom Oct. 11, and since then the market has advanced nine times and declined four. Last week saw three of those four declines.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was down 1/2 at \$168.90. There was a flood of record high earnings and a mass of excellent dividend news. But you couldn't tell it by the way the market acted.

Here are some items and the immediate reaction of the stock market:

U.S. Steel raised its dividend. The stock fell.

Bethlehem Steel reported record high earnings and declared the usual dividend. The stock fell.

General Motors reported record high earnings and booming sales. The stock gained only 1/8.

There were several reasons why the stocks acted as they did. In many cases, speculators and investors had been buying these stocks for days in anticipation of favorable action. Sometimes they built their hopes so high that they would have been disappointed at the measure of their disappointment was apparent in the selling that followed the news. In other cases, speculators had a profit and sold to turn that profit into cash as soon as the news broke.

Canadian issues were mostly lower on the week. McIntyre dropped 1/4 over the five day period, closing Friday at 72 3/4. International Nickel slipped 2 to 74 1/2. Canadian Pacific was off 1/4 at 31 1/4 and Hiram Walker eased 1/4 to 70 1/4.

Distillers Seagram gained 1/4 at 47 1/2 and Dome Mines remained unchanged at 14 1/2.

Giant Yellowknife added 1/4 to 5 1/4 on the American stock exchange. Lake Shore was off 1/4 at 4 1/2 and Royalite Oil dropped 1/4 to 13 1/4.

## Predicts Boost In U.S. Economy For Next Year

CLEVELAND (AP)—A boost in United States economy next year with record highs in employment is forecast by Steel magazine.

The biggest improvement will come in the second quarter with most industries sharing in the benefits, the metalworking weekly says. A minor dip may come in the second half but it should be moderated by the usual fall upturn aided by the national election, it added.

## Israeli Make Retaliatory Raid On Egyptian Post

JERUSALEM (AP)—Twenty Egyptian soldiers were killed and 20 captured Friday by Israeli troops who attacked a frontier post three miles inside Egypt, an Israeli military spokesman announced.

The foreign office said the assault was in retaliation for an Egyptian raid Tuesday on an Israeli police post and added: "If they leave us alone, we will leave them alone."

In Cairo, an Egyptian spokesman reported four Egyptians and four Israelis were killed in Friday's clash. He said the Israeli force was driven off. Egypt filed a protest with the United Nations mixed armistice commission and demanded an immediate hearing.

The fighting occurred at Kuntilla, three miles inside Egyptian territory in the northern Sinai peninsula, where the Egyptian said it maintained a post to check narcotics traffic.

The Cairo spokesman said the Egyptian force was very small but when the Israelis attacked just before 2 a. m. reinforcements were rushed in from nearby stations.

## Japan Having Food Troubles

TOKYO (AP)—Japan is having troubles with food products. First it was arsenic discovered in processed powdered milk. Thousands of cases were destroyed.

Then public health authorities announced that spot checks of this germ contamination of vast quantities of meat, sausage, preserves, and ice cream. Sales fell off sharply for a half a day.

Last week it was a controversy over worms in chocolate. A chocolate company said tests showed the worms were harmless if consumed by humans. Health officials said they were dangerous.

Thursday, Kira Tsuka citizens complained that their milk contained tiny white worms. The milk distribution agency expressed regrets.

## Britain, U. S. Line Up Middle East Program

GENEVA (AP)—Britain and the United States were reported Friday night to have set the main lines of a new drive to stall the spread of Soviet influence through the Middle East.

Diplomatic informants said after an hour-long meeting between Foreign Secretary Macmillan and State Secretary Dulles three immediate policy goals have been defined:

Buildup of the West's proven friends in the area militarily and economically.

Maintenance of the power balance between the state of Israel and its feuding Arab neighbors.

Weakening of the Egyptian-led grouping which is considering Soviet bloc offers of arms and economic help.

## Secret Of Oak Island Eludes Texas Oil Driller

OAK ISLAND N.S. (CP)—George J. Greene, a cigar-chewing Texas oil driller, ended a fruitless four week treasure hunt here Thursday but vowed he'd return in the spring to dig for Captain Kidd's legendary gold.

Greene sank four holes using diamond drills and found platforms of oak every 10 feet to the 111-foot level. Then the drills hit a cavity and went to the 180-foot level before they struck bottom.

"That cavity was really something," Greene said. "We poured 100,000 gallons of water into it and it ran out . . . but where I don't know."

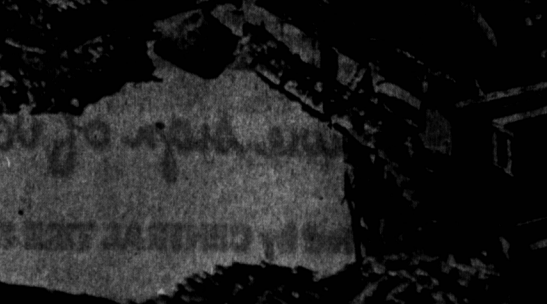
"I've found everything I expected to find with the exception of the confounded concrete vault," he said.

"I'm convinced we need a bigger drill and a mineral detector with a torpedo pipe to get to the bottom of the mystery of this island."

A detector is used by mining prospectors to log veins of lead and zinc. It measures the thickness of the metal seams and tells you where to dig.

"The holes we've dug haven't proved or disproved the legend about buried treasure. But they have convinced me that I should come back."

"Those layers of oak aren't a hoax," he added. "I'll return in the spring with a bigger rig and a detector."

## Leaves Estate To Start Fight

ALTAMOUNT, Tenn. (AP)—A spinster with an estate valued up to \$500,000 died here Sept. 11 without leaving a will. She told her lawyer intended to let her relatives fight over the money. That's what they're doing.

Lawyer Ben E. Caldwell said Wednesday that Miss Frances Moffitt, 64, came to see him a few months before her death and asked "what would happen" if she died without leaving a will.

"I advised her that she had a lot of people who would learn that she had a sizable estate and there would be a heck of a fight," Caldwell said. "She thought about it a minute, then just shook her head and said: 'That's all right. Let 'em fight.'"

No one was named as a beneficiary. An increasing number of newly found kinsmen have filed their messages of regret with the court-appointed administrator of the estate—especially since he estimated that
