SEIZURE OF SPAN HAN HWAN.

Foreign Flags Flying Over the Place.

VIENNA, Oct. 4.—The Admiralty has received the following despatch from Taku: "In accordance with the request of Count Von Walderssee, the seizure of Spaa Han Hwan was decided upon by the Council of Admirals on September 29th and all was prepared for the action. English ships were sent to demand its surrender and the Chinese evacuated the place. The British then hoisted their flag and the other flagships thereupon put up their respective flags over the toris."

DISASTER AT SEA.

The Ship Ellerslie Abandoned

BOSTON, Oct. 4.—The British steamer *Amara*, from Samarang, Java, via St. Michael's, has arrived here, having on board the captain and thirteen of the crew of the Liverpool ship *Ellerslie*, which was abandoned at sea, dismantled and waterlogged.

SUNDAY SCHOOL ASSOCIATION

Meetings Will be Held in Charlottetown Next Week.

The seventh annual Provincial Convention of the Prince Edward Island Sunday School Association will be held (D. V.) in the First Methodist Church, Charlottetown, on Monday and Tuesday, 5th and 6th October.

MEMBERS OF THE CONVENTION AND DELEGATES

Pastors of Churches, Superintendents of Sunday Schools, County and District Presidents, Officers and Executive of the Provincial Association are Ex-officio Members of Convention. Each school may send one delegate, and schools having a membership of over 100 may send two. Delegates who are not already members of convention as above will bring credential letter from the Superintendent or Pastor. If the Superintendent goes he will represent the school as a delegate.

ENTERTAINMENT

The local committee at Charlottetown promise entertainment to members of Convention and delegates provided the name is sent to the chairman, Mr. D. Schurman, Charlottetown, not later than Oct. 5th.

Let schools appoint delegates early and forward the names on a post card giving the name of the school, the lot or township number in which the school is held, the name of the delegate and the P. O. address.

If you find you cannot attend after you have notified the committee, kindly let them know. Have due regard for the committees and the families who arrange for your comfort. It is considerable disappointment to a family after they arrange for a delegate to have no one come.

CONVEYANCE.

Buy a Delegate's Return Ticket at one first class fare at any Station on the P. E. I. Railway. Good to return till Oct. 11th.

2nd. This ticket will be accepted for Return Journey when accompanied by a Certificate from the Secretary stating that holder has attended meeting for which ticket was issued. If either one is presented without the other the Conductor will collect first class single fare for return journey.

A Reception Committee will be in attendance at the First Methodist Church, and all delegates will report there on their arrival.

Prof. Hemill and other prominent S. S. workers will take part and this Convention will be a good one in every sense of the word. A programme will be issued in the press, and notices given from time to time.

The expense of calling the Convention and obtaining a deputation makes it necessary for this Association to ask for aid. Kindly ask your school to take up a collection for the Provincial Association, and send the amount with one of your delegates, or by letter to W. C. Turner, Charlottetown. Any sum will be thankfully received.

Collection will be taken at the Convention.
