A DIRECTOR of the Canada Cotton Co., in an interview with a Montreal newspaper reporter, said that the position of the Mill was never better. There was grey cotton in stock, and their agent says that the only difficulty he sees ahead is that the Mill cannot fill orders. However others state that there is over a million dollars worth of grey cottons stored in Montreal.

No. 3 Company 82nd Battalion, was inspected yesterday afternoon by Brigade Major Freeland at Victoria Park. The Band of the 82nd Batt., was in attendance, which had the effect of drawing together a considerable number of spectators. The men were put through ordinary company drill. On the whole they did very well, and were complimented by the Brigade-Major after the inspection was over.

FATAL ACCIDENT.—Last Saturday afternoon while Mr. Jas. Newson (a farmer living in Searton in the county) was threshing grain in his barn, a colt running loose, came in contact with the belt and knocked it off the fly-wheel. The passage between the machine and wall was quite narrow and the colt obstructing the way, Mr. Newson could not get back till the flywheel had gained very rapid motion. On suddenly applying the brake the flywheel broke in pieces, part of it striking deceased on the face and temple. He lived till about 6 the following morning (Sunday), but was quite unconscious from time of being hurt. Deceased was between 35 and 40 years and so far as we know was a hard working industrious man. He left a wife and three children with whom we sympathize in their bereavement.—Pioneer.

BUSINESS IN SUMMERSIDE.—The Pioneer reports:—White oats are coming to market in considerable quantities and sell at from 36 to 38 cents, with a downward tendency, shippers having large quantities in stock. Black oats come in but slowly and sell for 33 cents. In potatoes scarcely anything has been done so far, and they may be quoted at 16 to 20 cents per 60 lbs. according to variety—early rose and prolific bringing the latter figure. Mr. Holman has made the first shipment of potatoes from Summerside this season, having loaded the schooner "Victoria" with potatoes, turnips, black oats, etc., the prices being 16 for potatoes, 16 for turnips and 33 for black oats per bushel. Since last writing five vessels sailed with cargoes of white oats for ports in the West Indies, carrying a way close on 40,000 bushels. Four of these vessels were loaded by Messrs. Rogers and Holman. The former is at present loading the "J. L. Crossley," and both he and Mr. Holman are daily expecting other vessels to hold before the month expires.

AT the trotting horse breeders' meeting at Lexington, Ky., on Wednesday, the 10th instant, in the race for three-year-olds, Hinda Rose won in three heats. Time, 2.28 1/2, 2.32, 2.19 1/2. In the third heat she trotted against her previous record—2.20—and made the mile in 2.19 1/2, the best three-year-old time on record, distancing Wilkes Boy and Fugue.

THE thirty-fifth annual session of the Grand Division of Prince Edward Island, will be held at North Wiltshire, on Friday, the 26th day of October, inst., commencing at the hour of ten o'clock, in the forenoon. A public temperance meeting will be held in the evening, and will be addressed by delegates from various parts of the Island. The usual reduced railway rates have been kindly granted by Mr. Superintendent Coleman.

EVIDENCE in the action commenced by the city against the Charlottetown Woolen Factory for nuisance, was heard by the Stipendiary Magistrate to-day, and the case adjourned until Monday. The action arises from the managers allowing the refuse dyes and other matter from the factory to pollute the stream which flows from Spring Park. A judgment, we understand, will be entered against the factory if the owners do not find some other channel than the spring stream to carry off the poisonous water.

THE shooting match between a City Team and one from H. M. S. "Griffon," is in progress this afternoon on Kensington Range. At half past twelve the "Griffon's" men, who are composed chiefly of marines, were conveyed to the shooting grounds, and at one o'clock the first shot was fired. THE Morice failure in Montreal has a decidedly better outlook than at first anticipated. Mr. David Morice, at a meeting of those interested, stated that the bills due will amount to \$1,500,000, but that his assets show a clear surplus of \$300,000. The firm did business as commission merchants and the advances made to the mills were generally twenty-five per cent. less than the market prices of the goods and thereof ample security exists, he claims in goods, at present market prices, to cover all advances. If the bills payable amount to \$1,500,000 and the surplus at best to \$300,000 the assets of the firm must be \$1,800,000. A shrinkage of twenty-five per cent. would leave less than the bills payable. Mr. Morice states, however, that instead of a shrinkage, the prices of cotton have advanced five per cent., and, with the diminished output, the market would soon absorb the surplus stock, and in March, at the latest, would be hungry again. The meeting agreed to let matters go on, payments to be made pro rata. It is believed that the banks will fall in with this arrangement.
