Essay Winner Given Cheque

Judy Gail Callaghan, a grade seven Fort Augustus student, received the first prize cheque for her prize-winning essay at a ceremony at the regular meeting of the Charlottetown Lions Club last night.

Miss Callaghan's essay was on the subject "Care of the Eyes". The local Lions Club sponsors the contest annually in Queens County in co-operation with the Canadian National Institute for the Blind. The cheque was presented by Don Gallant, chairman of the sight conservation committee.

Taking part in the ceremony were Phil Bower, field secretary for CNLB, Sister Calre Teresa, school principal and Sister Raymond Francis, teacher of grade seven at the school.

Sister Raymond Francis was also presented with a bouquet of flowers in appreciation of her interest as tutor of the winning author.

Sister Raymond Francis graciously thanked the sponsors of the essay contest on behalf of Ft. Augustus School.

Five Witnesses Are Heard in Magistrate's Court Case

Five witnesses were heard yesterday in Magistrate's Court in the case of a Charlottetown man charged with failure to stop at the scene of an accident.

Following the hearing of evidence Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaust, QC, adjourned the case until Friday.

The charge arose out of an accident Sunday, May 17th in which a car allegedly driven by the accused struck an eight-year-old Royalty girl.

John P. Nicholson is crown prosecutor while the accused is conducting his own defence.

Several other cases were dealt with on the large docket. The case against a Mount Allison man charged with making threats to do personal injury was dismissed as was the case against a West Royalty man charged with parking an unattended vehicle on the travelled portion of the highway.

Two New Brunswick residents each drew fines of \$25 and costs or 30 days on charges of possessing intoxicating liquor at a place other than their residences. Convicted of being intoxicated in a public place a Breadalbane man was fined \$20 and costs or 15 days.

Failure to stop at a stop sign cost two residents of Charlottetown and one each from East Royalty and New Brunswick fines of \$5 and costs or five days. A similar charge against a city man was dropped.

A Vernon River resident drew a fine of \$20 and costs or 10 days on a charge of failing to stop at the scene of an accident.

Unlawfully using registration plates on a motor vehicle cost an East Royalty resident \$10 and costs or 10 days.

Residents of Vernon River and Charlottetown each drew fines of \$5 and costs or five days for operating motor vehicles with defective equipment.

During the past 15 weeks, some 20 young men and women have been participating in the University of Ottawa marriage preparation course at Charlottetown, under the direction of Rev. Preston Hamill.

Throughout this course, the group heard members of the clergy and professions speak on various aspects of marriage.
