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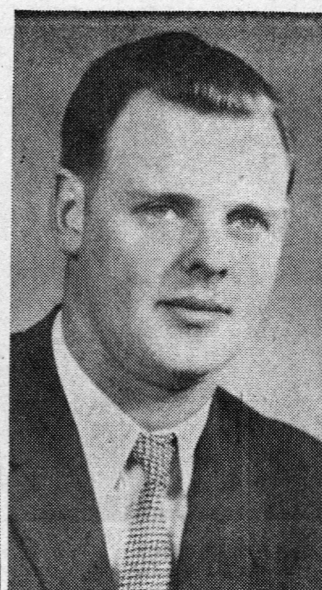

That's today's verdict for British women given in the autumn collection of Christian Dior's London house. It indicated that it will soon be correct to define busts and waistlines slightly.

But the Trapeze, a little modified and softened, is still the favorite outline.

Winter coats were wide and short, some stopping at the knees. Some had scarf collars. Neck lines of coats were nearly all loose, standing away from the shoulders.

The scarf collars were knotted tight or loose, according to individual caprice, or as weather may require. Black was the predominant color.

Suit jackets were short, with straight or bell - bottom skirts. The colors ranged from blacks through greys and browns, lighted up by a few reds and some emerald green.

A muted combination of mink brown and gold was used for a brocade cocktail dress. Demure little caps, apparently inspired by

the headress of nurses' uniforms, were perched on the heads of some models showing cocktail dresses.

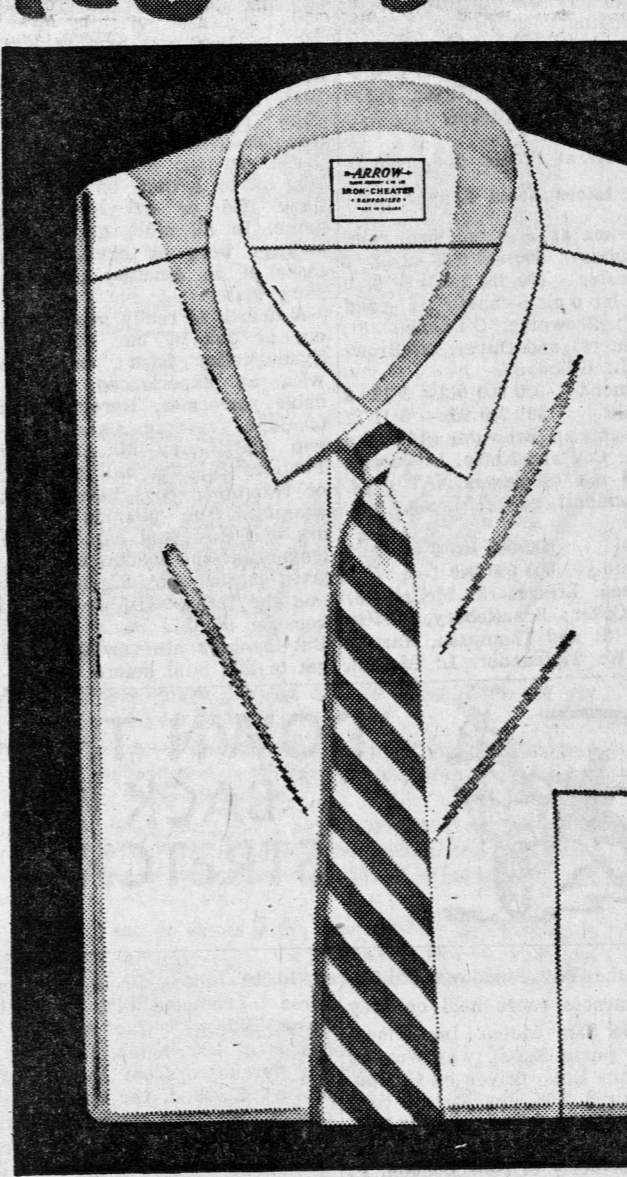
