

Mighty Lee Steps Mile In Year's Fastest Time

A Summerside horse Mighty Lee stepped of the fastest mile recorded so far this season in the Maritime Provinces as he swept to victory in both dashes of the free-for-all at Charlotteville Driving Park last night.

A large crowd of fans saw the roan gelding owned by Willard MacDonald of the western capital take an early lead in the opening dash and win going away in 2:08.3. The second time around he was nearly as fast winning easily in 2:09.2.

Mighty Lee was the only double winner on the card that was thrill dotted with upsets and new individual records.

Sister Dawn grabbed a new mark for herself in winning the first dash of the B paced in 2:11-5 and Nell's Lad dropped in taking the second dash in 2:11 2/5.

Willard's Choice also came up with a personal record winning the second dash of the C paced in 2:14 2-5 after trailing Perfect Hal to the wire the first time around.

Nokomis Belle picked up a new pacesetter mark and paid lucky backers \$19.40 in winning the curtain raiser D trot and pace. Murphy's Abbe took the D pace while Dexter Scott nosed out the Sheik in a photo finish to take top honors in the C trot and pace.

Good pays during the evening included: \$9.40, Murphy's Abbe to win; \$16.80 The Sheik to place; \$9.70 Perfect Hal to win \$8.20 Sister Dawn to win.

The daily double on Murphy's Abbe and Dexter Scott paid \$19.10 and the other double on Mighty Lee and Willard's Choice paid \$13.40.

Another big nine-dash racing card is scheduled tonight at the driving park and the first dash will get underway at 7.40 sharp.

Monday June 15—The weather behaved for this event and the only drawback was that it got a bit chilly before the card was completed.

Saturday June 20—The wind howled and the rain drifted like snow and another race card was postponed.
