Eugene Scanlon executive chef at N. Y.'s Waldorf-Astoria, started his training as an apprentice chef, and received his education in foods and the culinary arts, in the same hotel. On this foundation, he has built a great career and received world-wide acclaim. Like many persons who have won great success, he is modest, cooperative and willing to give and share his knowledge with others.

Unique Training Program
Chef Scanlon's great interest is to further the unique training-course the Waldorf-Astoria conducts for apprentice chefs. Only six young men are selected each year for the two-year program. Although the Waldorf-Astoria has never advertised this program, chef Scanlon receives from 55 to 70 requests for applications each year. He interviews every one of these young men personally, and then narrows down the group to 12 to 18 whom he re-interviews, and from whom he selects the six who will become apprentices. These young men are from 18 to 21 years of age and high school graduates. They come from all parts of the United States. The apprentices are paid while learning, and work 5 days or 40 hours per week.
