City Hospital Graduates Addressed By Dr. Shaw

"No longer do we think of education as having its chief merit in the fact that we cannot use it," Dr. L. W. Shaw, Deputy Minister of Education, told the graduates of the Charlottetown Hospital School of Nurses last evening...

"Perhaps one of the most noteworthy discoveries in respect to education," he added, "has been the realization that the whole person goes to school and not just the brain. The older idea was that the school should concern itself with packing the brains with knowledge and with training the pupil in the skills of reading, writing and arithmetic..."

Inseparable

"No longer does the educator think of himself as a kind of glorified service station attendant pressing the valve and filling up the tank—that is the brains—of pupils with all sorts of knowledge. We now understand that we cannot separate mind and body and emotions. They are merely facets of a unified whole..."

"Similarly this newer point of view in education is found in the attitudes of the modern doctor towards his patient. The doctor knows that it is the whole patient that comes to his office, not just his stomach, or liver, or heart. This person who comes to the doctor's office is not only physiological and all his needs must be taken into account in the treatment which the doctor gives..."
