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High School Slipping?

MONTREAL, April 1 The calibre of high school students entering Queen's University today is below prewar Dr. J. A. Corry told Montreal branch of Queen's Alumni.

He made an exception in the cases of veterans of the Second World War.

"They were a tonic for both teacher and university, but differences are starting to show now," he said.

Dr. Corry is professor of political science at Queen's.

"Perhaps we've grown old and the student body is getting younger," he said.

"The idea had been advanced that the lower standard might be due to what he described as the "dilution" of high schools.

He said he meant by that term that more pupils are attending high school than formerly and a wider variety of subjects is taught.

One thing seemed certain, he said — there was less concentrated drill on language and mathematics.

The English of some high school graduates is so bad, he said, that the university has decided to run a special course for those without sufficiently high marks in the subject or who fail to pass entrance tests.

Dr. Corry said the present type of high school student is neither a stimulus to the teaching staff nor a help to the university.

He insisted that teachers require stimulus to keep in top form. Queen's was particularly fortunate in being able to encourage its teachers to engage in research and scholarly works, because a fund had been anonymously provided for that purpose.
