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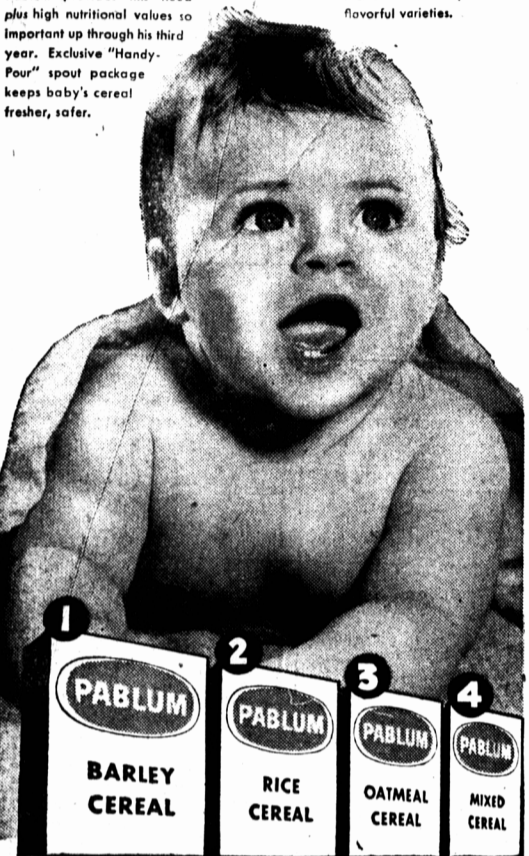
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**Georgetown and Vicinity**

**Boat Building Today In Georgetown**

A visit to the Boat Building Shop of Mr. Marcellus Gotell will show a fine lobster fishing boat, now nearing completion.

Once upon a time in the Town of Georgetown one could have witnessed many craft in the process of construction from the smallest type to ocean-going sailing ships. The years have brought great changes in a Town for years renowned for its shipyards, but the art of boat building, has not entirely disappeared and in Mr. Gotell's splendid boat has been constructed for a prominent lobster fisherman of this area, Mr. John Griffin of Panmure Island. This craft is 30 feet long, with a seven foot two inch beam and will draw 18 inches of water aft and from four to five inches forward. She is built of strip planking, one and three quarters inches by thirteen-sixteenths inches of New Brunswick white spruce. The keel is of Island yellow birch and the timbers are of Island juniper.

Mr. Griffin, with many years of highly successful lobster fishing behind him, provided the builder with the particular type of construction he preferred for his trade and Mr. Gotell has carried out the work with his characteristic fine workmanship and thoroughness for detail and exactness. The result is a beautiful boat which cannot but bring credit to its builder and complete satisfaction to its owner.

The Lobster Packing Plants of Mr. William S. Martell and The Redmond Export Ltd., are being put in readiness to handle the hoped-for large catches, which we like to think of as being associated with the early part of the season.
