Sermon By Mr. Justice Tweedy

NASHVILLE, Tenn., June 6—Mr. Justice George J. Tweedy, Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, Canada, is writer of a devotional message which will be circulated on June 5th among the seventy million readers of "The Upper Room", widely read book of devotions. Selection of a meditation for publication in "The Upper Room" is accounted a high honor because of the wide circulation and use of this devotional guide.
Judge Tweedy's meditation is based on Psalm 19: 14—"Let the words of my mouth and the meditation of my heart, be acceptable in thy sight, O Lord, my strength and my Redeemer."
In his meditation Judge Tweedy quotes a stanza of a hymn written by Charles Wesley: "Jesus, confirm my heart's desire
To work, and speak, and think for Thee;
Still let me guard the holy fire, And still stir up Thy gift in me."
He says: "The thought occurred to me several years ago that if we would make this our daily prayer, the worries and disappointments of life would pass away. 'Jesus, confirm my heart's desire' suggests a previous surrender and faith in Him who is our Keeper and Guide. Were all of us 'To work and speak and think for (God)' what a better old world this one would be! 'Still let me guard the holy fire' is a voicing of a desire to nurture those things which we held near and dear to us in early life. 'And still stir up Thy gift in me' suggests a desire for the renewing of a right spirit within us.
"This verse is my opening and closing prayer each day. It has helped me. I hope and pray it will help others."
The Upper Room is published bimonthly in Nashville under the editorship of Dr. J. Manning Potts. For each day it provides a page containing a Bible reading, a message based on that Bible passage, a prayer and a thought for the day. The May-June issue is a special lay witness number. The Upper Room is published in English, Spanish, Korean, Portuguese, Chinese, Swedish, Armenian, Tagalog and Ilocosa (Philippines) and Braille for the blind. All editions will carry the meditation by Judge Tweedy.

Imperial Press Conference At Quebec This Week

QUEBEC, June 7 (CP) — The freedom of the press and the tight newspaper situation in many Commonwealth countries "especially in England where further newspaper cuts are going into effect July 1—appear to be the two uppermost topics for the seventh Imperial Press Conference beginning here Thursday.
A group of Commonwealth delegates to the conference, held every five years, arrived here today aboard the liner Empress of Scotland.
They will spend the intervening time visiting the city and attending informal engagements.
Meanwhile other delegates, of whom 61 are listed, from 14 Commonwealth countries, will arrive independently in time for the opening business session of the conference Thursday.
The conference work will begin with the setting up of committees and election of new officers. Colonel the Hon. John J. Astor,

chairman of The Times Publishing Company, Ltd., London, who was president of the fourth, fifth and sixth Imperial Press Conferences, met the Empress today to greet Lady Violet Astor and the group of 36 publishers and editors.
Officials of the Canadian section of the conference, headed by Senator Rupert Davies, publisher of the Kingston, Ont., Whig-Standard, went aboard the vessel to meet the delegates.
Among them were Victor Sifton, publisher of the Winnipeg Free Press, Roy Thomson, publisher of the Thomson Daily, Brig. R. S. Malone, Winnipeg Free Press, honorary tour manager.
The conference moves on to Montreal Saturday and from there to Ottawa where most of the business sessions will be held June 14-17. The delegates will move on from Ottawa June 20 to Toronto and from there to Hamilton, Niagara Falls, Orillia and Muskoka.
The conference will come to a close June 27 in Toronto.

Double C. N. R. Service Commencing June 26th

MONCTON, N. B., June 7—Commencing Monday, June 26, the double train service, daily except Sunday, between the mainland and Prince Edward Island, will be put into effect, according to an announcement from regional headquarters of the Canadian National Railways here.
In addition to the service now operating leaving Moncton at 11 a.m. daily except Sunday, arriving Charlottetown 6.10 p.m., Summerside 5.50 p.m., train will leave Moncton at 4.40 p.m. daily except Sunday, arriving Charlottetown 10.30 p.m., Summerside 10.15 p.m. in the opposite direction, in addition to train now leaving Charlottetown at 7.00 a.m. daily except Sunday, Summerside 7.15 a.m., arriving Moncton 1.25 p.m., train will leave Charlottetown at 2.10 p.m., Summerside 1.45 p.m., arriving Moncton 8.25 p.m.
To provide for this additional service to and from Summerside, a train will leave Emerald Junction at 9.25 p.m., daily except Sunday, arriving Summerside 10.15 p.m., and will leave Summerside at 1.45 p.m. instead of 2.45 p.m., arriving Borden 4.35 p.m. instead of 5.35 p.m.
Effective Thursday June 15, the car ferry between Borden and Cape Tormentine will make eight trips daily in each direction, leaving Borden and Cape Tormentine piers, at 9.10 a.m., 10.35 a.m., 1.00 p.m., 2.40 p.m., 4.30 p.m., 7.30 p.m., 9.00 p.m., 10.30 p.m.
