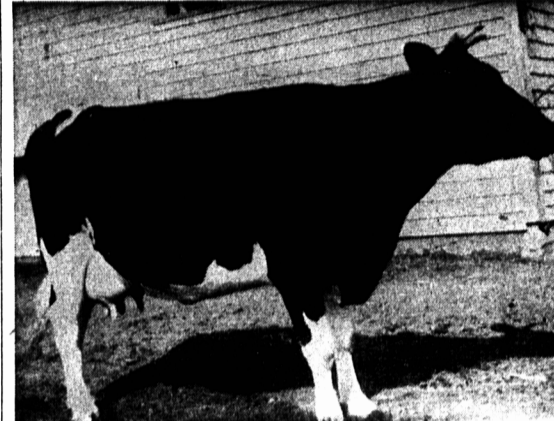

Rocky Marciano 5 To 1 Favorite For Tonight

(By Jack Hand) NEW YORK (AP) - Rocky Marciano whipped Ezzard Charles before and he's 5 to 1 to do it again tonight at Yankee Stadium in the fourth defence of his world heavyweight title. The continuation of their rousing June 17 battle is scheduled for 10:30 p.m. EDT with no home television. There will be a closed circuit theatre-TV showing in 70 theatres in 50 cities with New York and New England blacked out. A radio network CBS will carry the bout coast to coast in the U.S.

Although Charles lasted the 15-round route in their first meeting, it is the consensus of boxing writers and most of the fight mob that he will be knocked out this time. Only one writer of 39 polled picked Charles to win back the title he lost to Jersey Joe Walcott in 1951.

The pick here is Marciano by a knockout in about eight rounds and maybe quicker if Charles comes out swinging.

NORRIS OPTIMISTIC Jim Norris, president of the International Boxing Club, still talked about a crowd of 46,000 and \$25,000, just a bit under the \$24,392 gross for the first fight. Norris said \$300,000 was "in" when business opened Tuesday morning and he predicted an advance of from \$375,000 to \$400,000 before activities are transferred to the ball park.

The hot National League pennant race and hurricane Edna stole the play from the fight during the week-end but the promoters hope fans coming in for the Milwaukee-New York series also will take in the fight.

Charles, making an unprecedented third bid to become the first ex-heavy champ to win back the title, thrilled the fans three months ago with his game conduct under heavy fire. Although Rocky raised egg-sized lumps on his face in an all-out bid for a knockout in the 15th, the Cincinnati Negro refused to go down.

Report Sabre Jet Crashes Into Strait

CHATHAM, N. B. (CP) - A Sabre jet on a routine training flight from the RCAF station here crashed into Northumberland Strait Tuesday, taking the life of its sole occupant.

The victim's name was withheld until his next-of-kin receive notification.

The jet had been flying in formation with three others more than half an hour when it nosedived from 5,000 feet. Debris then appeared on the water surface. Cause of the crash, in "perfect" visibility, was unknown.

Searchers in a crash boat found the wreckage three miles southeast of Point Sapin, Kent county. At 70 feet of water, a diving team from HMCS Shearwater at Dartmouth, N. S., will begin operations at dawn, weather permitting.

Xavier Daigle, ground observer corps member at Point Sapin, flashed a call to the Moncton R.C.A.F. filter centre as the plane fell.

West German Exports To Canada At Post-War Peak

COLOGNE, Germany (AP) - West German exports to Canada reached a post-war peak with July sales totalling \$4,612,000, the association for promoting German-American trade announced Tuesday.

The July total exceeds by \$1,100,000 the previous height, reached last May.

Exports to the United States totalled \$25,700,000. The association said the statistics proved that the Canadian market, despite increased sales, is not yet fully developed by West German exporters.

Cargo Transferred In Mid-Air During Overseas Flight

GOOSE BAY, Labrador (CP) - A United States tanker aircraft carrying tons of fuel oil Monday successfully transferred its cargo in mid-air to a flight of U.S. B-47 jet bombers on a non-stop flight from England to California.

Group Capt. F. W. Bell, commanding officer of the RCAF station at Goose Bay, witnessed the refuelling in the Boeing tanker plane on invitation from U.S. Air Force authorities.

Change In Dates For Adding Interest

MONTREAL (CP) - The Canadian Bankers Association Tuesday announced a change in the dates on which interest is credited to individual savings accounts in Canada's chartered banks.

President T. H. Atkinson announced the interest will be credited henceforth on Oct. 31 and April 30 of each year, instead of Nov. 30 and May 31.

The change was made so that persons building up savings accounts to buy Canada savings bonds would not lose the interest on their accounts. The bonds are dated Nov. 1.

There were no other changes in interest provisions, including the date of two per cent annually.

Army Postings Are Announced

OTAWA (CP) - Posting changes for three senior officers were announced Tuesday by army headquarters.

Brig. R. L. Purves, 41, of Victoria, now chief of staff at central command, Oakville, Ont., is to be appointed vice quartermaster general at Canadian Army headquarters in Ottawa. Brig. A. E. Winch, 45, of Ottawa, who has been nominated to attend the Imperial Defence College.

Brig. G. E. R. Smith, 53, formerly of Victoria, and now commander Newfoundland area, at St. John's, will become chief of staff at Oakville.

Brig. J. A. W. Bennett, 52, formerly of Ottawa, and now commander Saskatchewan area, at Regina, will become commander in Newfoundland.

NEW YORK (AP) - All Weill manager of heavyweight champ Rocky Marciano, received a package in the mail Tuesday containing a tie pin and almost half the fight tickets recently stolen from his office. The returned tickets were valued at \$1,770. Tickets valued at \$4,100 were taken from his office originally.

Battle Of Britain Sunday To Be Observed At R. C. A. F. Station S'side

The Battle of Britain, one of the greatest aerial contests in the history of aviation, will be commemorated in Summerside next Sunday, September 19th. A ceremonial parade will be held to honor those of whom Prime Minister Churchill spoke when he said "never in the field of human conflict was so much owed by so many to so few."

The memorial service will commence with religious service to be held at the Protestant Chapel R.C.A.F. Station, Summerside, and at St. Paul's Church in Summerside at 11:00 o'clock a.m.

Church services will be followed by a ceremony to be held in Memorial Park commencing at 12:45. Wreaths will be laid by Captain W. H. Sweetman, D.F.C., D.S.O., D.S.O., the new commanding officer of the Summerside station.

Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, M.P., parliamentary assistant, to the Minister of Fisheries; and by Dr. G. J. Gallant, president of the local chapter of the R.C.A.F. Association. List Order of Return For Canadians In Korea; Cayuga To Be Withdrawn

OTTAWA (CP) - Defence Minister Campney Tuesday announced the early withdrawal of two-thirds of Canada's infantry brigade from Korea.

The defence department expects the greater part of the 6,000-man brigade will be home or on the way home by the end of the year, the minister said in a statement.

They will be brought back, he said, as quickly as arrangements can be made for handing over their duties and for transporting them. All that will be left in Korea for the time being will be one infantry battalion, one field ambulance unit and the elements for their administrative support.

ORDER OF RETURN The order of return will be: The 2nd battalion, the Black Watch, which will join its 1st battalion at Aldershot, N. S.

The 3rd regiment, Royal Canadian Horse Artillery, to be located at Debert, N. S.

The 4th battalion, Canadian Guards, to occupy Camp Ipperwash, Ont.

D squadrons of the Royal Canadian Dragoons; brigade headquarters and supporting units.

The destroyer Cayuga will be patrol duties and will not be replaced.

For the present, there will remain in Korea as part of reduced Commonwealth forces the 2nd battalion, Queen's Own Rifles of Canada, along with the ambulance unit and supporting troops.

The council will try to deal once again with the perennial bugbear of the shortage of candidates for the ministry. There now are about 2,000 United Church ministers in Canada, or about one for every 1,500 followers. The Canadian almanac lists about 3,100 but a spokesman said this figure includes more than 1,000 inactive retired clergy-men.

Primary Elections Held In Nine States Tuesday

NEW YORK (AP) - Representative Norris Cotton went into the lead Tuesday night in the first returns for the Republican nomination for a two-year Senate term in New Hampshire, one of nine states choosing candidates for the Nov. 3 general election.

In all, the voters picked nominees for five seats in the U.S. Senate and 92 in the House of Representatives, six governorships and numerous other state and local offices.

However, among the house incumbents seeking re-election, 70 were unopposed in the primary elections.

On the Democratic side, State Representative Stanley Bettley led Mayor Lawrence M. Picett of Keene for the two-year Senate term.

State Senate president Lane Dwinell defeated Elmer E. Bussey of Salem Depot for the Republican nomination for governor.

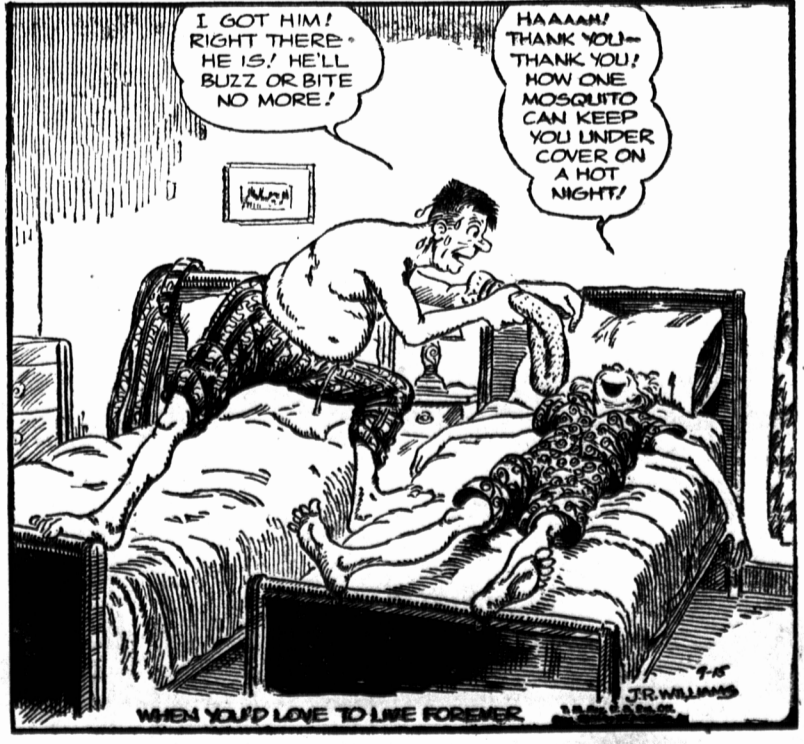
New Hampshire voters also nominated candidates for their other U.S. Senate seat. For the Republican nomination, Sen. Styles Bridges, president pro-tem of the Senate, was unopposed for a fourth six-year term.

Tuesday's balloting was in New York, New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Colorado, Utah and Washington state.

It followed up Monday's Maine general election in which the state elected a Democratic governor for the first time in 20 years.
