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St. Stephen's Anglican Church Annual Meeting

The annual meeting of St. Stephen's Anglican Church was held recently in the Church with the Rev. Ingram as Chairman. The meeting opened with prayer for the Parish and was followed by the reading of the minutes of the last annual meeting. Then the Treasurer's report was given by Mr. Ivan Harrington. He reported that envelope subscriptions had shown a sizeable increase during the year and this was sufficient to eliminate the necessity of the usual Fall financial collection. He noted that after much concern we ended the year with a very small balance.

The reports of the Burlington and Seaview Branches of the Women's Auxiliary, and the Sunday Schools in the same areas, showed evidence of a fruitful year. Membership had increased in all cases all obligations met. The Cemetery Committee report was given by Mr. Casely Adams in the absence of the Treasurer, Mr. Leigh Paynter. Besides showing a sizeable balance on hand, Mr. Keith Adams was commended for having kept the Church yard well mowed during the summer.

The Rector in his personal report noted that after several busy years the Church had an easier year as far as repairs go. This, however, would not be the case in 1955 when several big jobs had to be done. In his statistical report he mentioned that five of the oldest members of the congregation had passed away in the year which requested a suitable period of silent prayer in memory of their lives and work.

The success of the Every-member Visitation and Canvas held in 1953 was evident in the increased attendance, the corresponding increase in the prayer life of the people, and in the sizeable increase in the voluntary giving. He thanked the men for having so spiritedly cooperated at their Bishop's request in another visitation and canvas which resulted in a further pledged increase by all subscribers. In closing his report the Rector thanked the Officers and people of the Church for their enthusiasm and cooperation during the year.

The main object of their plans for the new year was the celebrations of their 100th anniversary this summer. It is planned to hold a week of Services around the last of June with different speakers each night. A Committee was set up to make final arrangements consisting of the Wardens and Vestry together with representatives from the W. A. and the A. Y. P. A. With this milestone in their history in sight the congregation have made plans to redecorate the interior of the Church in March and possibly the outside later. The Ladies of the W. A. have signified their intention to purchase material for at least a Green Set of Altar Hangings, to be dedicated at the opening service of the Anniversary Celebrations.

The following Officers were nominated by the nominating committee after a resolution was passed ruling that in the future one warden and one-half the vestry will retire each year. Wardens: E. W. Sudbury, and Borden Campbell. Vestrymen: Leigh Paynter, Keith Adams, John Adams, Brenton Cole, Roland Champion, Art Campbell, Nelson Paynter, Ellis Proffitt, Casely Adams, Wallace Adams, Jim Evans, Wm. J. Proffitt, Treasurer: Ivan Harrington; Vestry Clerk: Wm. J. Proffitt; The Cemetery Committee: Casely Adams, Ivan Adams, and Leigh Paynter.

Following these tiring Warden presentations gifts of appreciation to the Treasurer and Vestry Clerk for their years of service. The meeting closed with benediction by the Rector.

Miss Mary Farmer and John Walsh debated against a team from the University of New Brunswick. The debates having taken place in the latter part of the week, the results were not known at the time of writing.

BREAK VICIOUS CYCLE OF THINKING, ACTING

The problem of employer-employee relations has always claimed a great deal of attention from all sectors of society. Especially during the last 50 or so years, the problem has become particularly acute owing to the vast and penetrating development of technology and industrialism.

With this development, there has been an increasing conflict between industrialism's self-generated need for expansion and consequent voracious demand for efficiency to maintain itself on one hand, and the social and spiritual needs of man on the other.

It soon becomes obvious to an observer that at the heart of this problem is the question of power and force. Unreasonable demands for efficiency go hand in hand with necessity to accumulate great concentrations of power and force.

Power and force are principles of opposition. A war between the two is only necessary where a spontaneous unanimity is lacking. Love, not power and force, is the true principle of unity. Since love is the union of like wills.

Love of God and neighbor, the greatest of the commandments enjoined upon us by God, is based on a recognition of truth, the nobility of the human intellect enlightened by grace and an addition of the human person. The virtue of charity has been the great means of unifying Christendom throughout the centuries and of constituting the people not only as a unified spiritual body, but also as a social body.

SPIRITUAL UNION
The spiritual union in the mystical body of those formed in the image and likeness of Christ, is reflected in the social union of the people on the purely natural level. Just as love gives unity and cohesion to the spiritual life, so one and the same love makes for unity of purpose and action in social life.

Religion and the worship of God cannot be what they are unless the principles of love and mission and unchristian, charity brings a true and peaceful resolution of these forces. Justice which is called upon to settle these conflicts, is not true justice unless tempered by love and mercy.

No one disputes that laws which prescribe certain mechanical devices for attaining a balance of power between government, labor and management, are necessary; because one cannot deny that much peace and unity have been derived from them. But neither can we deny that many of the principles which

lie behind the formulation of these laws are the product of a social thinking that is prejudiced by the present state of our economy — which is seemingly based on a display of power and force.

There is no place in this vicious cycle
