To Lift Ban On U.K. Livestock

Executive Of P.E.I. Drama Assoc. Meets

At the conclusion of the Drama Short Course, the Executive members of the Drama Association met on Thursday evening, November 8th, for an informal discussion and to plan for the year's work ahead.

Discussions centered around the revision of the Information Bulletin (to allow for the inclusion of three act plays, and "Beginners' class"); appointments to Publicity Committee and Junior Drama Directorate; possible adjudicators for 1952 Festival; membership campaign; finances; and the need of a Drama Adviser for the Province.

A very pleasing feature of the meeting was the presentation of a gift to Mr. Meiklejohn from the Association for his most helpful instruction of the Short Course students. Mrs. Gates, the President, voiced the sentiments of all with her words of sincere appreciation to Mr. Meiklejohn and expressed the hope that when he came again, the class would be a much larger one. Mr. Meiklejohn replied most fittingly, and said it had been for him a very enjoyable three days with such an interested group.

A committee was named to interview the proper authorities concerning the need for a Provincial Drama Adviser as a co-ordinating as well as instructive aid. Slight changes were made in the rules which would permit three act plays to be included. It was also agreed that a "Beginners' class" should be added, so that the first time would not have to compete with the more experienced players who were familiar with Festival procedure.

It was also suggested that the adjudication given publicly during play-offs and finals, should be confined to general remarks. Marks and individual criticisms should be given privately to directors and players concerned.

The practice of placing group-memberships in the scholarship fund is to be continued as a means of building this fund at the present time. The need of a membership campaign was stressed and each liaison officer was asked to co-operate with the membership convener in this respect.

Catholic Social Welfare Bureau Opens Drive For Funds This Week

Although its doors are open to persons of all creeds, the funds realized in the annual drive of the Catholic Social Welfare Bureau are solicited from the Catholic people only.

The only voluntary organization of its kind in the Province, having as it does a staff headed by a trained Social Worker, it stands alone in the field of private social agencies to serve without charge, regardless of creed or color those unhappy individuals who are in need of the many services it has to offer.

Impelled by a conscious sense of social responsibility it crosses all barriers to translate the Christian social teaching into action. Whether it be in the field of child welfare, family welfare, unmarried mothers, nursing service, or relief from want, the Bureau stands ready, within the limit of its resources, to lend a helping hand to those in need.

Although this great work is undertaken cheerfully, the Bureau is greatly handicapped by the acute shortage of adoption homes, the difficulty in securing high standard boarding home care for the infant pending placement in foster homes and the lack of adequate housing for families in poor circumstances. Add to these the intricate and varied family problems, the many demands for food, clothing and fuel and it is easily seen that the necessity for a larger staff, equally qualified, and thus for funds, is very real.

profitable attendance there. At a late hour the gathering dispersed in complete agreement that participation in Drama, (in whatever capacity), was really worthwhile...

For the first ten months of the present year the Bureau has served 806 persons in some capacity or other. It has had 5,828 telephone calls and has made 966 visits. The Bureau has arranged the placement of and supervised 78 children in foster and boarding homes. This year assistance has been given to 46 unmarried mothers to date, besides giving material assistance to those unfortunate people whose standard of living is far below the normal level.

The Bureau maintains a full-time Registered Nurse whose total transactions so far this year number 1,041, comprising hypos, baths, dressings, sick visits and special treatments of various kinds as well as the child health supervision of the foster and boarding home children and many others who need her services. She also assists with investigation services.

The Catholic Social Welfare Bureau is able to carry out a program of such dimensions largely because of its low expense ratio. Its staff of two Sisters and a Nurse are supplied practically free by the Charlottetown Hospital. Its board of directors generously give their time without charge.

During this year the Bureau moved into newer and larger quarters, made necessary by its expanding activities, and it now presents one of the best appointed welfare centres in the Maritimes. The Bureau has many visitors, particularly since moving to its new quarters. Any person sincerely concerned over the welfare of their less fortunate neighbors will find much inspiration by visiting the Catholic Social Welfare Bureau at 129 Pownall Street. We wish them every success in their financial campaign this week.
