THE STANLEY.—The Stanley crossed to Plover yesterday and returned this morning arriving at Georgetown, at 10.30. She brought the usual large freight and about twenty passengers, who came to town on a special which arrived here shortly before two.

Mrs. HUGGAN'S DEATH.—The death of Mrs. Huggan, wife of Mr. W. T. Huggan, accountant of the Prince Edward Island Railway, which occurred last evening, will be heard with regret by a large circle of friends. Mrs. Huggan has been a great sufferer for some months. She was a daughter of Mr. W. E. Weldon, of Moncton, and was a devoted wife and mother. The bereaved husband and family of four—two sons and two daughters—have the sympathy of all.

EXCURSIONISTS.—A large number of persons both east and west, today took advantage of the fine weather and the cheap Easter rates on the P. E. Island Railway to come to Charlottetown. The special from the east brought three cars packed as full as they would hold and the special from the west brought four, besides those who came in on the regular trains. The regular eastern train leaves town this afternoon at 4 o'clock, and the western special at 4.30.

LOVE FEAST IN GRACE CHURCH.—The annual love feast in Grace Church, which seems to be growing in popularity, was held yesterday evening. The pastor opened the service by announcing a hymn, and the Rev. G. M. Campbell led in prayer. The pastor read the 3rd chapter of Ephesians, after which the Rev. George Dawson, M. A., of Cornwall, on delivered a forceful and profitable address in the words "God forbid that I should glory save in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ." After the address biscuits and water were passed around and partaken of by all present, and then fifteen persons, in quick succession, related briefly their religious experiences. The two hours passed most enjoyably and many went to their homes saying, "It was good for us to be there."

EASTER MARKET.

A Splendid Showing of Beef of Choice Quality.

The attendance of both buyers and sellers at the market today was exceedingly large, and Easter prices prevailed. The showing of beef was especially good, the quantity being large and the quality of the best. In Blake Bros. stall was to be seen three carcasses of lamb and six carcasses of beef, all of the choicest description. Saunders & Newson killed eight choice beef cattle, the majority of which they had in their stall today. They also had three fine spring lambs, and a carcass of excellent mutton weighing 102 pounds. Drake Bros., Thorne Bros., the Messrs. Ball, John McNeill, the Messrs. Brown, Barret Henderson, Rennie Jenkins, Pope Mills Henry Wood and the other butchers also had their stalls well filled with the choicest of meats, but pressure upon our space today will not admit of details. Rennie Jenkins had three choice lambs on sale, one of which tipped the scales at 30 pounds and was purchased for the Hotel Davies. The list of prices will be found below:

TEMPERANCE ALLIANCE.

Prohibition and the Scrimgeour Matter—Resolutions Adopted.

At the meeting of the P. E. Island branch of the Dominion Temperance Alliance, held on Thursday afternoon, the following resolutions were adopted:—

Whereas, This Alliance has learned with regret that the privilege of a private bonded warehouse has been granted to J. G. Scrimgeour, a violator of the Canada Temperance Act;

Therefore Resolved, That we hereby express our strongest disapprobation of such action on the part of the government and urge the government to immediately rescind its action in this matter and that we further disapprove of the principle of allowing private bonded warehouses for the exclusive storage of intoxicants in places where the Canada Temperance Act is in force.

Further Resolved, That we express our appreciation of the efforts of that portion of the Island press that has exposed and condemned the action of the authorities in this matter.

Resolved, That the P. E. Island branch of the Dominion Temperance Alliance view with profound regret the attitude of the Federal Government upon the question of prohibition, taking as they now do, a stand diametrically opposed to the will of the people as expressed in the plebiscite of September last.

That a minority vote should be accepted by any government as indicating a public sentiment adverse to prohibition is illogical and inconsistent with every recognized parliamentary precedent.

Further Resolved, That this Alliance in convention assembled pledge our individual and united support to the executive of the Dominion Temperance Alliance to strengthen their hands in pressing the question of prohibition upon the Dominion parliament.

Further Resolved, That the representatives of this province (which is almost unanimous for prohibition) be urged to give their strongest support to any measure introduced through the Dominion Alliance for the suppression of the liquor traffic.

Further Resolved, That we declare it to be the purpose of this Alliance and the duty of every temperance elector to use every means available to defeat every member voting against such resolutions and to elect any who shall vote in their favor.

Resolved, That this Alliance call the attention of all public bodies within this province interested in prohibition to the present attitude of the government upon that question, and request such bodies to take such action as to them may appear most effective, to induce the Dominion government to enact sound prohibitory legislation.

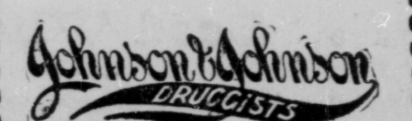
