JOHN BROWN, a boy about fourteen years of age, was on Tuesday evening arrested by Officer Cameron for searching countrymen's carts with intent to steal. The burglars, by means of a bar, endeavored to remove a shutter from the front door. As it was securely bolted, they failed. They then commenced removing the ribs of the shutter, but while doing this they were evidently frightened off by the approach of some person.

THE Montreal evening papers of Dec. 8th give long accounts of the abduction of Amanda Trudeau, adopted daughter of a wealthy proprietress, Madame St. Marie, of St. Andre street on Saturday night. She was a handsome girl, 18 years old, and had been sent on a message to one of Madame St. Marie's tenants, when three young men, respectively dressed, when three young men, respectively dressed, seized her, clapped plaster over her mouth and applied some drug which rendered her unconscious. When she regained consciousness she was being borne along by a carter in his sleigh towards Madame St. Marie's house, where she was left four hours after abduction. An analysis of a portion of the plaster left sticking to her hand showed it to be gum of strong adhesive properties dissolved in carbolic acid, and there were also traces of chloroform. This girl has been in the habit of collecting rent, and one theory is that the object of the hands was robbery. The truth of another theory will not be tested until she has recovered sufficiently to submit to medical examination. She is still suffering severely.

THE INDIAN AND THE MAIDEN.—Max Lyman, a prairie scout, who lived at the White River Agency a year and a half, and knew the Meekers intimately, tells this story to a reporter of the *Debuque Times*: "Ouray was in love with the eldest daughter of Agent Meeker, and I think that had this not been the case every one of the Meeker family would have been butchered. He often told me that he loved the white girl, and it made him feel badly to think that he could never marry her. I have seen Ouray follow her around and watch over her as if she were a child. He would do anything to please her. Ouray's sister knew that her brother loved the Meeker family and so took good care that no harm should come to them. I was there when the women were brought back, and Ouray was so happy that he rushed up to the Meeker girl and shook her hand for an hour. He tried hard to stop her from weeping, but she said, 'Ouray, you knew this trouble was coming all the time, and I can never forgive you.' I learn now that he is doing all in his power to bring the bad Indians in."
