# Annual Demonstration By Life Guards Is Set

The annual life guard demonstration is to be held at 7 p.m. Sunday, Aug. 2, at Stanhope main beach.

This demonstration is put on by the National Park Surf Life Guards. It is to display to the public the various pieces of equipment used on the beaches and the role played by guards and equipment in actual rescues.

This being the only province in Canada having surf life guards it is unique in this type of demonstration.

Competition between the Cavendish and Stanhope guards the stage for the demonstration. They will be performing actual rescues timed accordingly. There will also be displays of skin diving and water skiing and safety procedures dealing with both.

Swimming and water safety instructors of the Canadian Red Cross will give a display of first aid.

All the equipment used by guards will be on display for public viewing.

The life guards have invited the public to attend their annual year demonstration.

"The Musical Ride belongs to the Canadian people and makes for good public relations," Inspector Dowling said. Repeatedly the RCMP had applications from recruits who say their desire to enter the service stemmed from seeing the Musical Ride as young boys, he explained.

## CMHC Service Here Improvement Planned

Slightly revised arrangements for visits of Central Mortgage and Housing Corp. (CMHC) to the island have been announced here by Hon. J. H. Nicholson, minister responsible for the operations of the government agency.

John Mullaly, MP for Kings, has been corresponding with Mr. Nicholson in an effort to establish an office in Charlottetown, but later agreed with the minister that the present arrangement of serving the island from the Moncton office should be continued but changed slightly to make it more efficient.

The CMHC representative from the Moncton office will stay at the same location so that a contact point becomes well known to the people of the island. In addition, he will advertise for each of the next three months as to the days of visits and the location. Mr. Nicholson said the fixed location may have to be restricted to Charlottetown because of time and staff problems, but trips will be made to Summerside as occasion requires for the operations of the government agency.

"The corporation is arranging for a telephone answering service in Charlottetown," Mr. Nicholson told the Kings MP. "This will give the public a further contact point. On arrival in Charlottetown, the representative will communicate with the answering service and arrange for appointments. The Moncton office is going to make greater use of the long distance telephone service between it and the island. This will avoid tedious correspondence and give a much better service, even though it will cost slightly more."

The minister said that a program of information visits will be arranged to the island this fall and these will take the form of meetings with board of trade, chambers of commerce and other similar bodies anxious to have such public meetings.
