IMPURE AIR AND INEBRIETY.
 Some Rather Remarkable Cases Cited by a Physician.
 "A case was reported to me," says Dr. T. D. Crothers, in Popular Health Magazine, "by an eminent New York physician, of a merchant who tried to abstain from all use of spirits at home, without success. He worked steadily in his office and lived in a rich house up town, where, as parents, every condition of healthy living was present. After several ineffectual efforts to give up all use of spirits, he went out camping in the White Mountains for several weeks. He returned to the city on the first of the next season, and found that he had lost all his appetite and energy, and was unable to do his work. He was moved out in the country, and all sorts of tonics were tried, but he gave up his city residence, and lived out in the country, coming to the city for a few hours at a time, and has been a total abstinent ever since."
 "On return to the city he drank again and would not stop. The next season he moved out in the country, and all sorts of tonics were tried, but he gave up his city residence, and lived out in the country, coming to the city for a few hours at a time, and has been a total abstinent ever since."
 Another incident well verified, seemed to bring out the same fact: A delicate, nervous child of 6 years, supposed to be afflicted with consumption, was guarded with extraordinary care against colds and the open air in a rich city home. At 15 years of age a strong choleraic eruption continued until he was an inebriate. His mother died, and he was forced to go into the country to live. He became a total abstinent, and his health improved, but he was a strong temperance man. It would appear that in this case some condition of cell and tissue starvation began from early exertion and continued until the surroundings changed.
 I think poison from the defective oxidation of the blood, together with imperfect elimination of waste products, is a very active factor in inebriety. In all rational treatment efforts to remove these possible causes should precede all other means of treatment. The continual inhalation of impure and defective air is always followed by the accumulation of poisons which, in many ways unknown, cause reflex nerve disturbances and reactions. The heart contracts more frequently, respiration is accelerated and excretion of nutritive material is hindered in all the cells of the body. Fatigue, depression and lowered vitality follow. Alcohol at this time is a grateful narcotic, which not only conceals the real condition but brings increased degeneration with new bacteria formations and diminished resistance to disease. The nervous system suffers as much as any other part of the body, although this is not recognized.
TOLSTOI ON HUMAN SUFFERING.
 Nine-Tenths of Which is Useless and Could Be Avoided.
 Count Tolstoi writes in the Revue Encyclopedique as follows: "I know through a crowd of people—preferably city people; examine these tired, anxious, wasted faces; remember your life and the life of the men whom you have known intimately; recall the violent deaths, the suicides of which you have heard—and ask yourself the reason of all this death, suffering and despair. And you will see, however strange it may appear, that the cause of nine-tenths of human suffering is the present life of the world, that this suffering is useless, that it could be avoided, and that the majority of men are martyrs to worldly ideas."
 "Recently, on a rainy autumn Sunday, I crossed the market near the tower of Soukhraire in a street car. For a third of a mile the car made its way through a dense crowd that pressed against its sides. From morning till evening these thousands of men, most of them hungry and in rags, jostle each other in the narrow streets, and each one will seek their holes and corners. Monday they begin again their accursed existence.
 "Think of the existence of these men, of the situation which they abandon, and of that which they choose. Consider the labor of the poor, and the despises, and you will see that they are martyrs."
 "All have left their fields, their houses, their families, their children, often their wives and children. They have renounced everything and come to the city in order to acquire that which the world considers necessary. All of them are there, from the operative, the coachman, the samostress and the prostitute, to the wealthy merchant, the office-holder, and the wives of all of them, to say nothing of the tens of thousands of unfortunate who have lost everything and live on scraps and handouts in the free lodging houses.
 "Go through this crowd, watch poor and rich alike; look for a man who says that he is satisfied and believes that he possesses what the world deems necessary; you will not find one in a thousand."

Religious Thoughts.
 Reflections and News Items to be Taken Along With the Sunday Breakfast.
 The unbeliever doubts the efficacy of prayer, but the faithful members of a congregation of a little church in Brooklyn believe in it more firmly than ever. A year ago, with their pastor they left their church because the clergyman felt that he was not justified in Scripture in receiving his salary, \$2,000 and a parsonage. With his few followers he decided to build a church that should be absolutely free, he to donate his services. For a year the little edifice has been in course of construction interrupted time and again by lack of funds. Sometimes the work would be carried forward by the congregation themselves, old men and young dignified the benches. At last the church is closed, and dedication services were held a week ago. The faithful effort of Pastor Alonzo has won him the sympathy of a large number of Brooklynites, so that now the funds are coming in.
 Mission in Turkey.
 The eyes of the world have been centered on Turkey since the Armenian massacres more than ever before. All honorable men in America and Turkey must be evangelized. She is not fit to govern Christians. There has been a number of agencies at work in the land, but the work of the American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions is beginning to be felt. Among them are Robert College, in Constantinople; the Girls' College, in the same city; Burdett College, at Harpoot; Central Turkey College, at Aintab; and the Theological Seminary at Marsovan, in Asiatic Turkey. In addition to these there are countless common schools, girls' schools and other educational institutions.
 Religion and Business.
 "Man of Business! the atmosphere that you breathe may not be very inspiring, to godliness of life. But surely your warehouses, your shops, your counting room cannot be so unfavorable to Christian living as Neo's abominable court. Your business, I take it, is an honorable one, if you study pursued. If not, quit it instantly. If it is a lawful calling, then enable it by serving God in it every hour. A counting house, a warehouse, or a broker's office is as good a place to preach Jesus Christ in as any pulpit in the land. If there are tricks in any trade, if there is an increasing tendency to fraud in business transactions, then all the more need that you should provide things honest in the sight of all men and so conduct your business that some Christ might audit your books and stamp every page with His approval. It will be of no avail for you to say that you are a man of judgment but if there were placed in "unfavorable circumstances" or in religious atmosphere. No one ever deceived a man or woman by pleading as a prisoner, Paul, and his brave associates under the shadow of Nero's brutal and bloody despotism."
