Wolf Cub Leaders Embark On Gilwell Training Course

Wolf Cub leaders from nine Prince Edward Island centers gathered at Camp Kingston, Crapaud on Friday evening for the first part of a two-week-end Gilwell training course. Gilwell training is the most advanced training course offered to leaders in the Boy Scout movement and is sponsored by the Provincial Council, Boy Scouts of Canada.

On the first week-end, the training course covered smartness and good order within the Wolf Cub section of Scouting, star tests and the badge system and techniques of presenting these tests to boys of Wolf Cub age, campcraft, the law and promise, trails and wide games, exploring nature and administration within the pack.

The second in the series of week-ends will begin on Friday evening of this week.

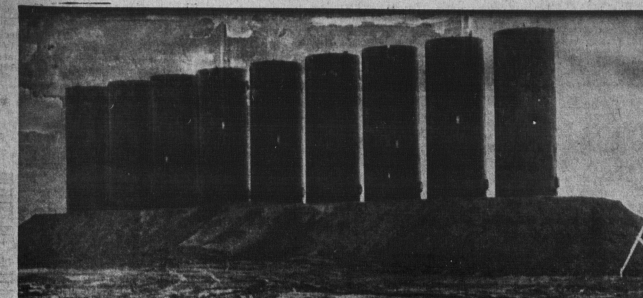
Also discussing the new cen-
