Canada's Male Athlete Of '64

TORONTO (CP)—Bill Crothers, Canada's outstanding male athlete of 1964 in the 30th annual Canadian Press poll announced Wednesday night, said: "I've never been impressed as all by awards but this one is an honor to receive."

The world's top half-mile track star who celebrates his 24th birthday Christmas Eve, added: "I wish Harry had won it."

His reference was to sprinter Jerome Yonover, runner-up in the balking by sports editors and sportscasters across the country. "I deserve it," Crothers added.

Jerome, 60, holder of the world record of 10 seconds for the 100 metres, made a big comeback this year after dropping ranks last in the 1960 Olympic games at Rome and the 1962 British Empire Games at Perth, Australia.

He damaged a thigh muscle in a race in a cast for months and finished third in the 100 at Tokyo and followed with a close fourth in the 200.

Crothers, second behind New Zealand's Peter Snell in the Olympic 800 metres, said he hoped to continue running "for quite a few years yet."

Hodge Gets 2nd Shut-Out As Area Nips Rangers

MONTREAL (CP)—Montreal Canadiens tied two second-period goals to blank New York Rangers 2-0 Wednesday night as five goals Charlie Hodge his second National Hockey League shutout of the season.

Montreal played without Jean Beliveau, who sprained his left knee after being checked at the start of the first period, and never returned to the ice.

Hodge made 25 saves in posting the shutout, his second against the Rangers. The first was Oct. 15 at New York, a 2-0 victory in the league opener for both teams.

Goaltender Jacques Plante, making his first appearance of the season on Montreal ice, was the victim as Canadiens unleashed 36 shots on their old mate. He had to be outstanding on the ice to keep the Rangers out of the third period when he stopped John Ferguson on a save on a blazer by left wing Tremblay.

The Rangers have now scored only one tie in their last seven games and remain ninth in the fifth place.

Will Brown Hold Colts?

CLEVELAND (AP)—Cleveland Browns coach Paul Brown will face a stern test against Baltimore Colts in the National Football League championship game Sunday, and some observers predict Johnny Unitas, the sharply-angled, fast-traveling punter, will be too much for the Browns to handle.

But Bernie Parrish, left cornerback for the Browns, disagrees, although he admits that the Browns' secondary probably faces its toughest test of the season against the aerial-minded Colts in the game, the Grey Cup of the United States.

He says confidently, "We'll beat the Colts and our defence will give a good account of itself after them (the Colts) on every single play. We'll keep going after them. I don't think our secondary has anything to be ashamed of."

"We've done a better job than was expected at the beginning of the season. I don't go along with any thinking that we won the defensive backfield."
