Japanese Premier Heckled By Reds

TOKYO, May 20 — (AP) — Japan's crusty little Conservative Premier was heckled and detained at a small-town railway station by Communists.

"Rescued" by police after five to 10 minutes, Premier Shigeru Yoshida was quoted by the Kyodo News Agency as declaring, "If the Communist Party repeats incidents like this, it should be outlawed."

Last week Yoshida had said Japan would consider outlawing the Communists only after seeing what happened in other countries. This was in response to suggestions by Gen. MacArthur that Japan ought to consider outlawing the Reds as agents of a "predatory international force."

Tonight's incident at the Toyama Station in Western Honshu is almost certain to react against the Communists politically.
