ANOTHER disaster with loss of life is reported as having occurred on Lake Ontario during a severe gale on Saturday night. The news was received from Pictou. On the vessel was the schooner "Harry Folger," bound from Cleveland, Ohio, to Brockville, Ont. She went ashore near Pictou, and became a total loss. All on board—the captain and crew of eight men—were drowned. MR. JUSTICE PETERS gave judgment to-day on the question raised by certain shareholders of the Bank of Prince Edward Island, who objected to being placed upon the list of contributors for a greater sum than \$64.44 per share. He decided that a call of \$30 per share be made upon the Directors of the Bank, and reserved further judgment as to the liability of the shareholders until an examination of the Directors shall be held before him.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.] More Trouble in Turkey—The Sultan Scared. CONSTANTINOPLE, Dec. 4. The Sultan has suffered a great scare His Sublime Highness has discovered (or thinks he has discovered) a plot to assassinate him; and consequently he has taken refuge with his wives in the Royal harem. He is closely confined and guarded.

Another Steamship Lost—But no Lives. ST. JOHNS, Nfld, Dec. 4. The steamship "Liddesdale," from New Orleans for Rival went ashore on the coast of this Island, in a fog, and is a total wreck. The crew have been saved.

Congress Opens. WASHINGTON, Dec. 4. Congress opened to-day.

The North Shore Railway. MONTREAL, Dec. 4. The best authorities here state that the Grand Trunk Railway Company, and not the Pacific Railway Company, have purchased the North Shore Railway.

GENERAL CABLE NEWS. LONDON, Nov. 3. There was only about 80 members present in the Commons, when prorogation took place on Saturday afternoon. The Lord Chancellor read letters from General Wolsley acknowledging his gratitude for the formal thanks tendered him by Parliament for his services in Egypt.

The Queen's speech was then read. In it Her Majesty states that the relations of England with all foreign nations are at the present time cordial. The proposed commercial treaty with France has not been concluded, but there has been no falling off in the friendly intercourse and governmental dealings between the two countries. On the contrary there is such an increase in international courtesies as had strengthened the bonds of friendship at present uniting them. The Queen then at length recites her thanks for the successful operations of the army in Egypt, asserting that the success had avoided other measures which were tending to disturb the tranquility of the British possessions existing in the East. The growth of the revenue, although retarded had suffered no diminution, either in general receipts or duties on intoxicating liquors. The distressed and disturbed condition of affairs existing in Ireland were referred to with particular regret that their outcome has such association, but it was hoped that the great social improvement now noticeable in that country would continue under the new laws.

DEUBLIN, Dec. 3. Quinn, assistant secretary of the late Land League, and Davitt, have been summoned to appear and enter into recognizances for good behavior. It is expected that Healy will be served with a writ on Monday. The writ against Davitt is founded on his speech at Navan, last Sunday. He is required to appear in a Court of Queen's Bench on Tuesday. Davitt says he will appear and defend himself in person, and not by counsel. He will probably decline to enter into recognizances for good behavior, preferring to go to prison. Healy only arrived at Dublin at ten o'clock on Saturday night.
