'Berry Festival' Success Viewed From Two Angles

MONTAGUE — The first Montague Regional Strawberry Festival from an entertainment point of view, was a "howling success." However, if you use money raised as the yardstick it could be called a dismal failure.

It was the opinion of the chairman of the festival, G. Arnold Wightman, who presented his report to the festival committee Wednesday evening at the town hall, Montague.

The gross receipts were \$5,304.70 and expenses \$5,015.01 leaving a balance net profit of \$289.69.

The three-day program included the Lower-Montague Regatta, a concert by the Charlottetown Centennial Choral, children's parade, street dancing, the sky divers, float parade, coronation ball, meals, strawberry short cake (the world's largest) — Maritime shows, and the strawberry queen contest.

Mr. Wightman stated the support given by most citizens was to a large extent responsible for the success of the event. It is after all, participation that makes any event successful and the more participation you have the more marked will be the success. In conclusion he said "thanks are due to so many people, organizations and businesses that I find it impossible to list them all. I know they will accept a simple and sincere thank-you."

"I do wish to express my personal appreciation to you, the members of the strawberry festival committee. Your many hours of careful planning and hard work were, in the final analysis, the backbone of a successful festival."

A decision was reached to call a meeting to determine just what can be done for 1965 in regard to the regional strawberry festival. It is hoped that all or-

ganizations and those who participated last year will attend this meeting with a tentative date of Tuesday, April 27.

It was the opinion of the committee that the festival should be carried on with possibly a two-day program and perhaps drop from the Lower Montague Regatta because of the separation of the events at Montague and Lower Montague.

MP Prys Gov't On Causeway

Questions designed to pry more information out of the federal government about the Prince Edward Island causeway have been placed on the Commons order paper by Health Minister MacQuarrie, MP for Queens.

He is asking how many private firms or organizations have submitted proposals for the construction of the causeway; the names of such groups; whether any decision has been reached as to whether the crossing will be constructed by private or

government agencies; whether a decision had been reached as to whether the causeway will carry rails; if not, when such a decision is likely to be made; and finally, whether construction is to commence in 1965 and if so, on what date.

Similar questions have been asked in recent months but both Mr. MacQuarrie and Hon. J. Angus MacLean, senior MP for Queens, have expressed dissatisfaction with the answers that have been provided by the departments of transport and public works.

A more detailed answer about the government's intentions for the causeway has been promised after the second phase report on the project has been received from Northumberland Consultants.

Mr. MacQuarrie's questions are likely to be answered early next week when parliament resumes its new session following the Easter recess.

Accused Pleads Guilty To Break, Theft Charge

SUMMERSIDE — A 40-year-old F.E.I. man, Edwin DesRoches, 19, entered a plea of guilty before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald in Prince County Court yesterday morning on a break, entry and theft charge and was remanded in custody until April 29 after electing trial by magistrate.

The charge arose from a break into the Arsenault General Store at Leville on April 17. RCMP Constable J. K. Greer of the Alberton detachment, testified for the crown.

Reported taken in the break was approximately \$20 in small change.

The accused was remanded in order that the provincial probation officer be contacted.

Testimony in the case of Melvin Joseph Colquhoun of Freetown, charged with speeding, was given by RCMP Constable Whalen of the Borden detachment.

The accused, who had pleaded not guilty to the charge at an earlier hearing, failed to show up yesterday. He was found guilty on the charge and fined \$10 and costs.

On a charge of being intoxicated in a public place, a Borden man was fined \$20 and costs.

Middleton Man Found Not Guilty

SUMMERSIDE — A resident of Middleton, William Emmet Smith, was found not guilty to a charge of impaired driving when he appeared before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald in Prince County Court Tuesday.

Mr. Smith, who was represented by Bernard St. Clair McCabe, had pleaded not guilty at an earlier hearing.

Two-Year Suspension Handed One Accused

Charged with break and entry with intent, John G. Malone of Charlottetown was given a two-year suspended sentence and ordered to post a bond of \$2,000 with two sureties of \$1,000 each when he appeared before Magistrate A. James Haslam, Q.C. in city police court Thursday morning.

He was also ordered to pay damages.

James Earl MacCallum, Charlottetown, who also pleaded guilty earlier to a charge of break-entry with intent was remanded until today.

Bernard Frederick Donley charged with selling liquor to another person had his case dismissed.

Magistrate A. James Haslam said, in dismissing the case, that in so far as the defence witnesses, the accused and John Henry Reid, were concerned "there appeared to be little regard for the truth." He also felt that Dawson Hooper, with his record of convictions made a most unreliable key witness for the crown. The evidence gave no confirmation as to what actually took place.

Const. Charles M. Clark, RCMP, appeared for the crown and Allison M. Gillis for the defence.

Albert Gordon MacEwen, Middell, charged with having no driver's license, was fined \$10 and costs or five days.

Wesley Nicholson, city, charged with illegal possession of liquor was fined \$20 and costs or 30 days.

FINED \$125 Joseph Earl Harding, Summerside, charged with drunken driving, pleaded guilty to the lesser offence of impaired driving and was fined \$125 and costs or 30 days.

Two accused, Arthur Ernest Gormley, and Charles Allen Shaw, both of Charlottetown, charged with theft under \$50 had their cases adjourned until April 27.

A case of assault against Derryl McLure, city was withdrawn.

Spud Marketing Plan Favored 3-1 To Stay

As a result of Wednesday's plebiscite, the Potato Marketing Board plan has been upheld by a vote of almost three to one in Prince Edward Island it was learned from Wendall MacKay, deputy provincial secretary. With 122 polls heard from out of a total of 173, the score was 1025 voting "yes" in favor of the Marketing Board plan, and 336 voting "no."

Kings County completed its total with all 46 polls heard from and the score was 360 voting "yes" and 130 "no."

In Queens County results were available from 34 polls out of 69 the score was 411 voting "yes" and 129 "no."

In Prince County with 22 polls heard from out of 58 there were 254 voting "yes" and 130 voting "no."

Though returns are still not complete, the results to date have established beyond a any doubt, Mr. MacKay observed,

that the plan has been endorsed by the eligible voters.

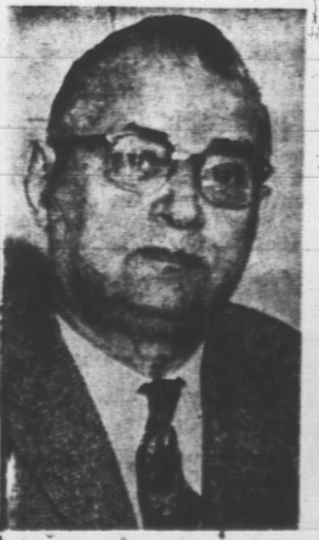
More than 5,000 were eligible to vote yesterday but the total will fall well below one-half as only 1,430 had voted in 122 out of the 173 polls which were open to receive votes yesterday.

Next step in the Potato Marketing Board is that the present scheme or plan will become permanent, and a new board will be provided by the end of next month.

The new marketing board will comprise three dealers who must also be producers, and six producers, two to be named from each of the three counties. The present board has three members named by the potato dealers, three by the P.E.I. Co-operative Association and three by the producers.

The Co-operatives will lose their representation in the new board.

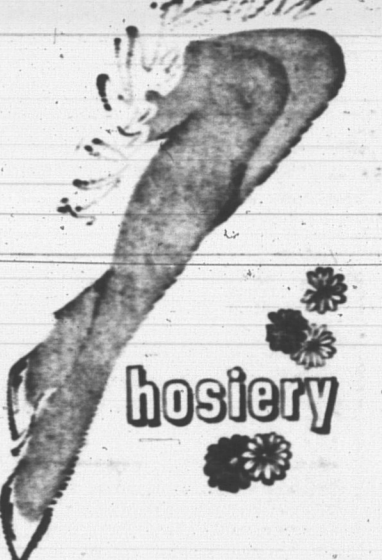
