



QUEEN PRESENTS TROPHY TO WINNING DRIVER

Queen Sees Mighty Lee Smash Local Track Record

With Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth and His Royal Highness Prince Philip looking on, Mighty Lee a six-year-old roan gelding smashed Charlottetown Driving Park's record yesterday before a crowd of 3,000 wildly excited fans.

The slick pacing machine went the twice around in the first dash of the free-for-all in 2:04.3, shattering the old pacing mark set by Newport Chief at Old Home Week of 1956.

The Royal Couple saw this terrific performance but they had left for the garden party at Government House when Mighty Lee reined by George Calbeck continued his record breaking.

In the second mile of this feature attraction, the speedster owned by Willard MacDonald of Summerside and Rankine MacLaine of Charlottetown turned on the heat in even more sensational fashion. This time he was clocked in 2:03.4, another track record but better still a new race record for Mighty Lee.

Don Seaman had the honour of reining the other winner while the Queen and the Prince watched with keenest interest. Don with Victory Scott came roaring down the stretch to nip the favourite Ginger E at the finish line. It was the first dash of the Junior free-for-all and the Syndicate Stables entry did the mile in a neat 2:07.1.

On their arrival at the track, the Royal Couple were presented to track officials and their wives by Premier A. W. Matheson. Those receiving the introductions were Cecil Stewart and Mrs. Stewart, H. J. Kennedy and Mrs. Kennedy and Commander G. H. Buntain and Mrs. Buntain.

Just prior to their departure, Her Majesty and His Royal Highness Prince Philip were introduced to Lt. Col. D. A. MacKinnon, D.S.O. by the driving park president, Mr. Stewart. The Royal Couple chatted for two minutes with the veteran reinsman who is still active in the race game despite his 82 years.

Every person in attendance went there to get a glimpse of the Queen. They gave Her Majesty a tremendous welcome as she took her place on the platform adjoining the judges' stand. These same race fans had an idea they might see a new track record hung up on this blistering warm July afternoon.

They got everything they came for and a little more. The sensational miles of Mighty Lee far exceeded the hopes of even the most ardent fan. On top of all this they saw a great trotter fall dead on the track just prior to the first dash of the junior free-for-all.

Sally Volstead, a 5-year-old brown mare owned by Ray MacCallum, Marshfield reared up and then fell dead on the track at the top of the homelane. It was the only unpleasant thing of the afternoon's great program.

Other winners on the eight-dash card were Christie's Best, Vesta Wick, Izzie Reynard, and Sir Joseph. Izzie captured both trips of the C pace and Sir Joseph, going his best mile in a long time, split honors with Victory Scott in the junior free-for-all. Christie's Best, Vesta Wick and Izzie Reynard all lowered their own race records with Izzie beating his both time out.

WESTBURY, N.Y. (AP)—Training sessions were begun Wednesday by all seven of the trotting champions from Europe and Canada in preparation for the \$50,000 International Trot at Roosevelt Raceway Saturday night, Aug. 1.

Newspermen, photographers and newsreel cameramen were on the scene getting their first look at the trotters who'll represent France, Italy, Sweden, Norway, Germany and Canada in the 1 1/2 mile classic.

Trainer Horn, the U.S. color-bearer in the big race, will join his seven rivals stabled in the flag-draped International quarter this weekend.

The seven-year-old stallion, driven by the leading U.S. reinsman, Billy Haughton, will compete in the \$50,000 National Championship trot at Yonkers, N.Y., raceway tonight.

Jamin, France's hopeful in the International, was worked two trips at a mile and a half each by his trainer-driver Jean Riard. Riard reported his six-year-old campaigner in top shape.
