

Sees Good Prospects For Tourist Grant Extension

Prospects are bright for extension of the \$300,000 Federal aid to the tourist industry in Canada's Atlantic Provinces, it was disclosed here by George V. Fraser, director of the Prince Edward Island Travel Bureau, who has just returned from a meeting with Alan Field, director of the Canadian Government Travel Bureau, in company with R.A. Tweedie, director of the New Brunswick Travel Bureau. Mr. Fraser met with Mr. Field and requested continuation of the area promotion campaign, the first such program attempted by the Canadian Travel Bureau. This advertising campaign amounting to \$300,000 went into effect in January and has resulted so far in 64,231 inquiries from prospective visitors to this part of Canada.

Mr. Fraser said that, following discussions with Mr. Field, the two Maritime directors felt sure the area promotion would be carried out again with Federal money in 1958.

While in Toronto, the Prince Edward Island Travel director represented the province at a testimonial dinner for D. Leo Dolan, former director of the Canadian Travel Bureau, who was recently named Canada's Consul General in Los Angeles.

There is a series of 3 polio inoculations. The 1st and 2nd are given four weeks apart and the 3rd inoculation not sooner than six to seven months after the 2nd. Inoculations against diphtheria, whooping cough, tetanus, and smallpox vaccination also given. Keep in touch with the teacher who will be notified of the first clinic date.

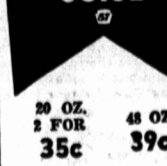
