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Let's Talk It Over

Someone has said that the three important factors of success in scholastic endeavour are brains, ambition and instruction. There is nothing anyone can do about the first factor, but the latter two should be subject to consideration for improvement. It has been noted that quite often, the leaders in high school are not the same ones who head the lists in universities. Since the brain factor would remain constant, it could be that the different types of instruction in high school and in universities might furnish the answer. Often in high schools the energetic, strict teachers carry the students along whether they (the students) have much ambition for the job in hand or not. In universities they are much more on their own. If they have been "forced", they naturally sag back into lower brackets.

So, in a sense, it can almost be said that the more careful the instruction in high school, the more disappointing the results may be in college. If students are properly instructed in high school, however, that is, if their initiative is encouraged, and they are trained to rely on themselves, there should really be no let-down in the higher centres of learning.

How a pupil will progress in the later stages of his education will depend, we think, on the percentage of "inert" facts which he has been stuffed with, as compared with the percentage of vital facts that are "springboards" for other vital facts. For it is still true that a lot of the facts in some schools are items of information that adults would never think of committing to memory because they can be so easily looked up, when wanted. The emphasis should be on skills, rather than on facts, though, of course, certain vital facts have to be woven into the pattern of primary education, to furnish fodder for the skills.

The stuffing of pupils with "inert" facts is, however, fast disappearing from our teaching methods and results are showing the improved techniques. In spite of what the critics say, a larger portion of our total population probably writes better, spells better, figures better, and speaks better than ever before. Because our school population has increased so much, it is probably true that the proportion of poor pupils has also increased, and this is what the critics of modern education are pointing their accusing fingers at. It seems natural, however, that a large number of those who are being induced to remain in school longer, would be inferior material.

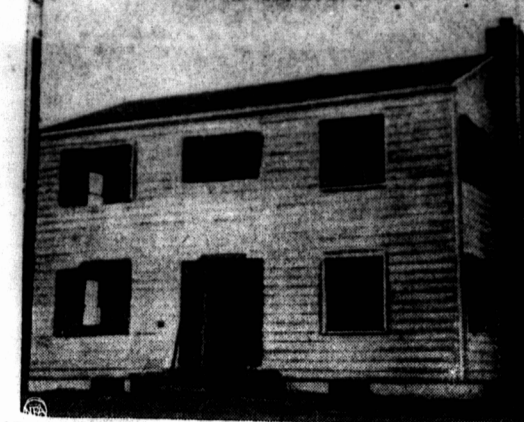

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Plan To Observe Air Cadet Week

The Air Cadet League of Canada will observe national air cadet week during the period April 12th to April 18th, inclusive, it was announced yesterday by league president, H. D. MacGillivray.

In cities and towns across Canada, 236 air cadet squadrons will observe the special week by holding church parades, "open houses" and other functions which the public will be invited to attend.

Main purposes of air cadet week is to provide the provincial and local committee of the league with an opportunity to campaign for public support.

In making his announcement, Mr. MacGillivray appealed to "all public spirited Canadians" to support the league's activities.

He stated that over 75,000 Canadian boys have received air cadet training since the movement was founded in 1941; 50,000 have attended summer camps; close to 2,000 have been taught to fly; 307 top cadets have made goodwill exchange trips abroad; and 80 cadets have received educational scholarships having the total value of \$50,000.

"During the past two years, over 30 new cadet squadrons were opened," the league president said. "Our steady growth is proof of the fact that most Canadians have recognized the great value of our training program for Canadian youth. We are confident that this interest will be translated into effective support during national air cadet week."
