**Legitimists See Monarchist Drive Gaining Momentum**

VIENNA, July 9.—(A.P.)—Continued conversations tonight aroused greater hopes for relieving German-Austrian tension than have been apparent for many months.

Vice Chancellor Eduard Baer-Baarenfeld departed on an official visit to Premier Julius Goemboos of Hungary. Observers regarded the trip as an important foreign policy step.

The unexpected disposition of the Government to talk with Germany has had a dampening effect on the Monarchist movement in Austria. Legitimists, however, expressed confidence that obstacles in the way of a German rapprochement were too great to be overcome and that the Monarchist drive would regain momentum soon.

At the same time Chancellor Kurt Schuschnigg's long-cherished dream for an economic federation in the Danubian basin received support from a Rumanian quarter.

A sort of revival of the old Austro-Hungarian Empire, for business purposes only, has been urged of late by an increasing number of statesmen and economic specialists.

**King Makes Flying Tour R.A.F. Stations**

LONDON, July 9.—(C.P. Cable)—The King today made a flying tour of several stations of the Royal Air Force and inspected at first hand new equipment built under the country's augmented rearmament program.

He flew in his own private plane, accompanied by his brother, the Duke of York. He was flown by his own personal pilot, Flight-Lieut. Edward Fielden.

At each air station demonstrations were given of the planes and other new defence equipment. One of the three stunt fliers at Northolt who performed daring feats in the air at the special request of the Sovereign was a Canadian, Flying-Officer MacLachlan.

"I've never seen such a flying exhibition in my life," he exclaimed after witnessing daredevil demonstrations by pilots of the bombers and fighting squadrons.

Both the King and his brother were most interested in the latest so-called submarine spit-fire single seater fighting plane, declared to be the fastest military machine in the world. The King climbed into the cockpit and made a thorough examination of the various gadgets.

**Agreements Reviewed At Anthracite Probe**

MONTREAL, July 9.—(C.P.)—Harry Aird, British Coal Corporation president, told the Tory Royal Commission yesterday his company had no contracts or correspondence with wholesale or retail merchants in the Montreal area relating to the selling price of imported anthracite coal.

He was the only witness who appeared before the commissioner, Dr. H. M. Tory of Ottawa, at the opening day of the inquiry into the importation and distribution of anthracite coal in Canada. Mr. Aird, in addition to being British Coal Corporation president, is also vice-president of St. Lawrence Stevedoring Company, Limited, and Canadian Import Company, Limited.

"Is there any correspondence, contracts, or agreements with wholesale or retail merchants in Montreal area pertaining to selling prices of anthracite coal?" Commission Counsel Bernard Bissonette, K.C., asked the witness.

"There are no agreements and no correspondence, only ordinary contracts of sale," replied Mr. Aird.

He told of an agreement negotiated in Feb. 1935, whereby the British Coal Corporation bought all its Welsh anthracite from the

**AMALGAMATED COLLIERIES OF WALES** and said his company received a "nominal commission" for handling amalgamated's coal in Canada.

The agreement did not work to the exclusion of other Canadian firms dealing with Amalgamated Collieries, however, Mr. Aird said. The P. P. Weaver Company, which had an agreement with the Pasco Coal Company of Wales, also purchased Welsh anthracite from Amalgamated's collieries for transportation to Toronto.

When Weaver company made purchases from Pasco that were subsequently sold to British coal corporation the shipments came billed to Weaver and were turned over to the British coal corporation.

"Is Weaver's price any different from Amalgamated?" asked Mr. Bissonette.

"Yes," replied Mr. Aird. "Pasco's coal may cost more than Amalgamated."

He said there was no profit in the transaction for Weavers however, because the British Coal Corporation's remittance was taken by the Bank in Montreal and paid to Pasco in Wales.

"In other words, we are both selling agents for Welsh anthracite coal. We are anxious to make sure we can meet our requirements."

The British Coal Corporation, he said, distributes Welsh anthracite coal to Weaver Coal Company and the Canadian import company who in turn sell it to retailers each at the same price. The British coal corporation notified its distributing agents in Montreal at what price they could sell the coal.
