Newsman See Site Of British Atom Bomb Blast

PERTH, Australia (Reuters)—A Wednesday. They were the first civilians to get a look at it since the explosion.

The newspapermen said the bomb exploded between the northwest part of Trimouille Island and the northern tip of Hermite Island. It fell in an area of small bays and coves similar in appearance to a river estuary common on Britain's coasts.

The test demonstrated what might occur if an atomic bomb exploded in a British port in the hold of a visiting vessel.

U.S. To Admit Increased Number Of Refugees

WASHINGTON, (AP)—President Eisenhower signed into law Friday a bill to admit 214,000 extra refugees, orphans and other aliens into the United States in the next three years.

The bill finally sent to the President is a compromise measure containing many provisions aimed at screening out any Communist agents among the immigrants to be admitted over and above regular quotas.

Senator Pat McCarran (Dem. Nev.) led a fight against the measure but finally accepted the rewritten version, which will allow the admission of a somewhat smaller number of aliens than Eisenhower originally proposed and also will lengthen the period of the program from two to three years.

The largest number of visas is allotted to persons who have escaped or been expelled from behind the Iron Curtain and have streamed into Western Germany or Western Austria.

The new law authorizes the admission of 55,000 German expellees and 35,000 refugees residing in Western Germany or Austria. It also permits the entry of 10,000 expellees residing in North Atlantic Treaty Organization countries, or in Sweden, Iran or the Free Territory of Trieste.

The law earmarks 45,000 visas for Italian refugees, 15,000 Italians, 2,000 Greeks and 2,000 Dutch who, even though they may not be refugees, have close relatives living in the U.S.
